Return Wartime Ideals Is Legion Head Wish

World Made Safe for Democracy Has Turned to Selfish Things.

BOSTON, Mass., April 7.—(U.P.)—Ten years ago today the United States declared itself to be in a state of war.

Ten years is a substantial part of a man's limited life. Even in the life of a nation it is a tenth of a century, and but few nations have endured through many centuries. These ten years have been for the United States the years when young vigor reaches mature strength.

We have traveled at a tremendous pace in these years. We have produced wealth at a rate never before imagined. We have made vast developments in the things that make life comfortable and pleasing. But in the eyes of the great Eternal have we gone forward from the spot at which we stood at this hour ten years ago? Ten years ago America was united with one clear thought and one exalted purpose. With no motive of aggression, with no wish to profit, this nation threw itself into a terrible war to vindicate our national ideals and defend what we believed to be the rights of humanity.

The American people then stood exalted, sacrificing, suffering, dying, all for the purest of idealism.

"Make the world safe for democracy." To the American people that phrase was as real as the earth upon which they walked. They stinted their stomachs for it; they submitted to obnoxious discipline; they went out and gave their lives with it alone as the motive. In these years that have passed what has become of this idealism? Where is that spirit which caused men and women to forget themselves, to deny themselves, to sacrifice themselves? It is hard to find among our enormous new wealth. Our whirling machines give it no room. Our frantic amusements leave it no time.

There are those now who scoff at the very words which clothed the ideals that men endured and died for ten years ago. The back wash of disillusionment has swept in. The torch that America held up for a moment to an expectant world has been dashed out.

But in France lie thirty thousand Americans for whom came no dimming of the light which illumined the nation. With crosses gleaming white against the green of French fields and hillsides we have marked the places where they rest. They died with the flame of the ideal blazing within them and there at the hallowed spots where they lie it must still be burning.

We are going back to France this year, we men of the American Legion, with our wives and our families. We are going to hold our convention in Paris, we are going to revisit the scenes of our war service and we are going to enjoy some of the pleasure of a trip abroad. But our greatest purpose in recrossing the sea is to do a thing which we hope may contribute at least one small spark to the rekindling of American idealism. We are going to stand again beside the crosses of our dead.

We hope that standing there we can feel something within us take fire again from the spirit of those dead, something which will cause us to look up from ourselves and see a bigger conception of life than that which we have been following.

We will not be able to explain. Perhaps we cannot even understand. But we hope to be able to feel, and feeling, to act. We hope to come back gripped by the resolution that if ideals were important enough to die for ten years ago they are today important enough to command something of our lives. Surely standing beside those graves we will realize that those men lying there did not die in order that we could live in a whirl of self-centered forgetfulness. And realizing that we will come back to America inspired to peace-time service to the country they died for and we served ten years ago.
