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## DISCOURTEOUS REGISTER.

The Eugene Register rather discourteously takes The Sentinel to task for its editorial approval of the courteous "thank you" with which "operator" answers the patron who has placed a call.

The gruff and boorish Register says:

The phrase "thank you" is the courteous formula for the acknowledgment of a favor received. The subscriber bestows no favor upon the switch-board operator when he takes down his receiver and gives him his number. On the contrary, he makes a demand on her and she complies with his demand. It is he, therefore, who receives the favor and it is he who should murmur "thank you."

Thus we find upon careful analysis that the order referred to does not really promote courtesy. As a matter of fact, it is based upon a wholly distorted conception of the workings of formal courtesy requiring the donor of the favor to render an acknowledgment that is not deserved and leading the recipient of the favor into the bad habit of accepting that which has not been earned.

The Register usually displays a sagacity that offsets its boorish ways with telephone operators, but in this instance there is no redeeming feature.

The Register probably will admit that telephone operators talk to many more people than all other classes of employees in the world. With this contact with the world in general, "operator" has a better opportunity to teach courtesy than is afforded any other class. So far so good.

Now, will The Register contend that over-courtesy on the part of one person promotes discourtesy and rudeness on the part of another? Of course not. Over courtesy on the part of one merely emphasizes the lack of it on the part of the other.

The Register makes one statement that shows a flash of its old-time sagacity when it says that the person placing the call should be the one to say "thank you." But that fact merely adds force to the courtesy on the part of the operator.

What is the effect on the editor of The Register when he yells into the phone in a gruff stentorian snarl for number so and so and "operator" courteously answers, "thank you." We'd wager a year's subscription to The Sentinel against a lifetime subscription to The Register (which would be giving The Register a frill the best of the betting) that his face crimsoned slightly, that his heart softened.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN: That sealed bids will be received for Three Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty-eight Dollars Eighty-one Cents (\$3,958.81) of Cottage Grove, Oregon, Improvement Bonds Series "O" by the city recorder of said city at his office in the city hall, Cottage Grove, Lane county, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. April 25, 1927, at which time the bids for said bonds shall be opened and considered by the common council of said city.

Said bonds shall bear date the 1st day of April, 1927, and mature in ten years from date thereof and are redeemable at the office of the city treasurer of the city of Cottage Grove, Oregon, upon payment of the face value thereof with accrued interest at the date of payment at any semi-annual coupon period at or after one year from the date of such bond or bonds.
