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EMBRYONIC EDITORS HAVE TROUBLES.

That in some ways education has not made the growing generation superior to the one that is grown is indicated by the fact that an effort is being made by the student council, or publications committee, or both, to curb the editorial activities of the editor of the Emerald, University of Oregon publication. The editor has seen fit to give expression to ideas that do not harmonize with ideas of members of the student council and of the publications committee.

Putting a curb on editors has been a leading outdoor sport for many years, although having fallen somewhat into disrepute during recent years. In the good old days about which we like to prate, but in which we should not care to live, a newspaper editor was subservient to party, or to the whims of the financial interests which supported him, or to the saloon element or some element that controlled the city or town in which he published his paper. Even churches did not hesitate to put the clamps onto the editor who showed too many signs of independence, which fact this writer knows from personal experience in a town dominated by a single church.

Of those who soon are to take our places we expected more than this. This is the age in which we hear much about a new-found independence, about greater freedom for the expression of opinion, in which we hear much criticism by the youngsters of those who would hold them down to old-fashioned ideals. An attempt to curb the editorial utterances of the editor of the Emerald is entirely out of harmony with the idea of a new-found freedom, out of harmony with the idea of individualism of which we have heard so much, and may be admission that this new-found freedom idea and individualism idea can be carried too far.

But the editor of the Emerald is standing up to his guns in a manner that we can't help but admire and is imitating in splendid

manner some of the great editors who have gone before him and who dared defy great interests who would have put them out of business, who risked personal safety and personal fortunes for the sake of a principle.

Some of these daring ones won the day and because of their daring carved for themselves niches in the hall of fame, while others were licked and were never again able to summon sufficient courage to tackle a dangerous issue.

Editor Sol Abramson and his associates on the Emerald expect to become Oregon newspaper editors, and the outcome of their present stand for what they believe to be right is likely to have considerable effect upon their later work as editors of Oregon newspapers. If they win it should not be in such a manner as may result in their becoming arbitrary and overbearing in their editorial attitude. If they lose, it should not be in such a manner as may make them cringe before editorial dangers of the future. We shall watch the outcome with interest.

DEATH PLAYS FAVORITES.

Up in Portland the operator of a motor car drove across a railway track while the danger signal was swinging, the engine bell ringing and the steam almost tearing the insides out of the whistle. The car was hurled a hundred feet or more. Rescuers found the operator of the car uninjured and still hanging tight to the steering wheel.

Down in California a few days ago something went wrong with a car that was crossing a bridge. It crashed through the railing and dropped a few feet to the bed of the river and four occupants were killed.

On an Oregon highway a car rolled over several times down a 60-foot embankment and all occupants escaped with only slight injuries.

On the same bridge down in California already referred to, a few moments following the first accident, another car chanced along. The driver looked down at the wreck below and involuntarily steered his car against the same railing and his car also crashed through to the bed of the river and four more were killed.

An aerial ace dropped several thousand feet a few days ago and climbed out of his wreckage uninjured.

On the same day a man in Chicago slipped on a sidewalk, fell backward onto the curb and was

picked up dead from concussion of the brain. Death certainly seems to play favorites.
