ALL AMERICANS SAVED FROM MEXICAN BANDITS

MEXICO CITY, April 21.—(U.P.)—Survivors of the passenger train attacked by Mexican bandits at Labarra, arrived here today so un-nerved by the massacre and burning of fellow passengers that they were unable to give a coherent account of their terrifying experience. The survivors included a number of Americans, who estimated the dead at 100. No Americans or other foreigners were wounded or killed. The government estimates the number of dead as 55. The surviving Americans said that the bandits did not deliberately burn any of the wounded passengers but that some were so seriously injured that they were unable to leave the train set fire by the bandits and perished in the flames, the bandits making no attempt to remove the bodies.

Schools Ask O. & C. Money.

Many school district clerks are writing to County Treasurer Schiska asking for their share of the O. & C. tax money, but acting under the advice of E. J. Moore, county school superintendent, the treasurer is sending only amounts to cover interest bearing indebtedness of each district and is retaining the remainder due until it is decided by the board of directors of each district what they intend to do with the money.

Some of the boards have already decided how to dispose of the money, and the treasurer will send the amounts due them as soon as they notify her.

Attends Funeral of Grandmother.

Mrs. George Brund and children George and Marcia returned last night from Brownsville, where they attended the funeral of Mrs. Eliza Robe, grandmother of Mrs. Brund and great grandmother of the children. Mrs. Robe was the widow of the pioneer Presbyterian preacher, Robert Robe, who organized the first Presbyterian church in Eugene, where he lived for a number of years. He was pastor for 30 years of the church at Brownsville. Mrs. Robe was aged 92 and died April 17. She was the oldest member of the church in Brownsville and the oldest resident in the town.

Lane Voters Are Dropped.

Several thousand names of voters in Lane county have been dropped since the last election and if these voters desire to vote at the special election June 28 they must register again, according to Walter D. Dilard, county clerk. The total number of legal voters now on the rolls is 13,175. At the November election there were approximately 19,000. Failure to cast a vote within two years is the major cause why the majority of the names were dropped.

Sapiro-Ford Jury Dismissed.

DETROIT, April 21.—(U.P.)—The famed million dollar libel suit of Aaron Sapiro ended with a flop today when Federal Judge Raymond, on motion of counsel for the multi-millionaire motor manufacturer, granted a motion for mistrial and dismissed the jury.
