SAN FRANCISCO, April 25.—(U.P.)—The death toll from accidents and suicides on the Pacific coast for the week end was high, the total being 23. Automobile accidents led the list of tragic fatalities, causing 12 deaths. Suicides were second with four being recorded in the northwest.

Deaths included those of Harriet Franklin, 25, and Mrs. Zola Schau, 21, both of Portland, who were killed in an airplane crash Danny Greco, pilot, was seriously injured.

John Banton, 72 year old, shot and killed himself with a rifle. Tom Watson committed suicide in Cottage Grove, shooting himself in the head with a small revolver. Andrew B. Irt of Ridgefield, Wash., fatally shot himself with a rifle.

Miss Arminia Mallay, 19, of Wallace, Ida., was hit by an automobile and died almost instantly. Fred Carlton, Frank Potts and Charles Graham were killed when their automobile plunged into a creek near Gresham.

George Wilson placed fourth in the 100 yard dash in the state relay meet held Saturday at University of Oregon. He was the only Cottage Grove high school athlete to enter. He also entered in the board jump but failed to place. His best leap was several inches over 18 feet.

Suit for O. & C. Money Is Started by State

Supreme Court Decision in Marion Case to Be Guide for 18 Counties.

SALEM, April 23.—The long expected suit by the state of Oregon to collect certain Oregon & California land grant funds from counties of the state was begun in circuit court here this morning. A petition for a writ of mandamus was filed by Attorney General J. H. Van Winkle in behalf of Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, to require members of the county court, the county clerk and the county treasurer of Marion county to pay over to the state the sum of \$24,059.41. It is claimed that this amount is due the state under the terms of the federal act under which the Oregon & California land grant refund was made to the counties.

In a tabulation of statistics compiled by Attorney General Van Winkle this morning, it is indicated that Marion county and six other land grant counties would gain by complying with the alleged terms of the act, while the remaining 11 land grant counties would lose.

All 18 of the counties which would be affected by a ruling in the Marion county case have banded together to resist the state's suit here, however, and both sides have announced that the result of the suit in Marion county will settle the controversy for the 18 counties.

High Power Line to Be Run to Black Butte

TOM AWBREY ATTENDS AGENT'S CONVENTION.

As a further safeguard, the association has distributed its liabilities through reinsurance with 18 large eastern mutual companies, whose combined assets, with the Oregon Fire Relief, amount to over \$16,000,000, thus removing all possibility of a fire calamity which might seriously deplete the reserve, and earning it the title of "Giant of the West." Mayor Baker and President Briedwell of the chamber of commerce of McMinnville, also Governor Patterson, were among the speakers.
