Heroic Measures Fail To Save Life G. Kerr

After Traveling 100 Miles Patient Is Too Weak for Operation.

The funeral of George G. Kerr, former resident of this city, who died Saturday, May 21, at Marshfield, was held Tuesday, May 24, at Portland, which was the family home for many years.

The cause of death was ulcers of the stomach, instead of pneumonia, as first reported here. Mr. Kerr had been a patient for several weeks in a hospital at Gold Beach, but a week or more before his death was taken by ambulance to Marshfield, a distance of 100 miles and the longest trip ever made by an ambulance in that section. The conveyance was given right of way both ways over the road. When Mr. Kerr arrived at Marshfield it was found that he was too weak to undergo an operation.

Mr. Kerr was born in Kansas and was nearly 63 years of age. During his early life he was a resident of Portland, going from there to Wedderburn to manage a store for R. D. Hume. Following that he was in business in Cottage Grove for many years, selling out here in 1920, and returning to Wedderburn to manage the same store he had before managed but which had passed into the hands of the Macleay estate which is managed by B. K. Lawson, also a former resident of Cottage Grove.

Surviving Mr. Kerr are his widow, who is an invalid at her home in Wedderburn; a son George; two sisters, Mrs. A. Harper and Miss Kerr of Portland, and one or two brothers. Miss Esther Silsby of this city is a sister of Mrs. Kerr.

Lindberg, trans-Atlantic aerial ace, announced today that he would leave Saturday from Cherbourg, France, for the United States aboard the destroyer Breck, which will arrive in New York June 14.
