Matrimony Too Hard, Bride Kills Herself

Prominent Workers Say Women Fail to Make Best Success of Marriage.

DENVER, Colo., May 30.—(U.P.)—If women "would use as much effort toward making matrimony a success as they do to keep their jobs, they would find themselves more happily married," Mrs. Margaret Taub, one of Denver's best known insurance agents, believes.

Her comment was occasioned by the suicide of Mrs. Beatrice Browning, young wife of a paper hanger. Near Mrs. Browning's body was found a clipping with the following quotation:

"The girl who gives up a good job to get married, nine times out of 10 has to work twice as hard, and gets no appreciation for what she does."

"So many women," Mrs. Taub said, "think that when they get married, they are going to be cared for the rest of their lives without any effort at all on their part."

"But life is difficult no matter what we do and anyone who gets married must realize that that, too, demands a certain amount of sacrifice and effort."

Mrs. Fred Dick, pioneer Denver club woman, agrees with Mrs. Taub.

"I believe in marriage," she said, "and I believe in marrying young. If a girl loves a man enough, she can overcome the difficulties and the troubles that come at first with financial affairs."

"Girls who marry young and whose husbands are not substantially fixed financially must be willing to give up a lot that many girls aren't willing to give up nowadays."

Judge George A. Luxford said he believed the young suicide's viewpoint as expressed in the clipping was "exaggerated."

"Women's natural sphere," he added, "is still in the home and I don't believe she works any harder there than in any office."

"Wives with only household affairs to take care of should be able to make a success of marriage."

Dogs Act to Curb Earwigs, Belief

SEATTLE, Wash., May 30.—Charles Abbot Newhall, local chemist, sees a very rational reason why a proposed ordinance, prohibiting dogs from running at large, should not be passed.

Birds, he says, are the best killers of the European earwig, which, imported accidentally a few years ago by a ship from Europe, has since multiplied in such countless quadrillions that it constitutes a real pest.

The natural enemies of birds are cats, he says. The natural enemies of cats are dogs.

Therefore, according to Newhall, if the dogs are tied up the cats will increase in numbers, kill off all the birds and the earwigs will go merrily on propagating until they will take possession of the city.

Ships, Planes to Bar Summer Liquor Traffic

Federal Dry Officers Arrange Great Lakes Campaign to Offset Wets.

CLEVELAND, May 30.—(U.P.)—To stem the flow of rum which thirty Ohioans are expecting from the liquor dampened shores of Ontario, federal prohibition officials are preparing to throw up a barricade of ships, guns, airplanes and men that will resemble the defending forces of a nation besieged by countless hordes of enemy troops.

Here are some of the things Arthur Fenton, collector of customs for northern Ohio, told the United Press his superiors in Washington have promised to help him keep his territory as dry as the Sahara:

Three hundred heavily-armed customs agents along the Lake Erie shore from Erie, Pa., to Toledo, O. Three hundred undercover men in Canada to "tip off" coming invasions of rum runners.

Radio equipment to keep the "armies" on both sides of the lake in close liaison.

A fleet of fast hydroplanes to keep a constant patrol on the coast line.

Addition to the present coast guard fleet with heavier armament.

Fenton declared that each group of agents stationed along the lake front will be prepared for all emergencies in meeting any efforts of invasion by rum runners. The hydroplanes are to be equipped with rifles and machine guns. The bigger coast guard boats will carry one-pounders.

Cleveland will become one of the important bases for the summer campaign against smugglers. A base for one or more hydroplanes is contemplated at the exclusive Cleveland Yacht club in Rocky river, a suburb.

"Prohibition can be enforced, if they supply sufficient men," Fenton said. "And I have been promised the men and equipment I deem necessary."

"I was with the army on the Mexican border. We kept the Mexicans from crossing the line down there. We can keep the rum runners from crossing the line up here. All that is necessary is to have a sufficient force. Washington has promised me that force and I am prepared to show that prohibition can be enforced so far as smuggling goods from Canada into this territory is concerned."

Fenton declared that narcotics and other smuggled goods will not be overlooked in the concentration upon the rum runners. He asserted that the enlarged force in this district will enable the government to keep stricter watch on smugglers of all kinds.

Bozah Favors Law.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—(U.P.)—Senator William E. Borah, noted dry advocate, will support and may sponsor the abolition by congress of its one pint in ten days liquor prescription limitation. Senator Borah said that if doctors succeeded in curbing the unscrupulous in their ranks he would not mind introducing such a bill.

LORANE HIGH SCHOOL GIVES TO FLOOD WORK

The school children of Oregon have undertaken to put this school in repair for the opening of the fall term.
