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HOSS FOR THE STATE HOUSE.

Oregon editors, generally speaking, do not seek public office, with the result that under a system which requires that the man must seek the job few editors have ever held office in the webfoot state—not that they aren't just as capable on the average, or more capable, than many who have been placed on the state pay roll.

One reason that editors have not sought office may be the terrific expense of being a candidate. Being good business men, and knowing the importance of watching the overhead, they have not believed it wise to expend so much where there would be so little in return. But in recent years some editors have emerged from financial obscurity and at the same time salaries for public officials have been advanced to a figure that makes it possible for the official to earn as much there as he would in private life, and there now remains no good reason why an editor here and there shouldn't be placed on the state pay roll.

All of which is leading up to a suggestion to Governor Patterson that he has the opportunity, or is likely to have the opportunity, to appoint to the position of secretary of state one who has been prominent in editorial affairs, one who has made a success of the newspaper business, one who always has given liberally of his time for the welfare of others, one who has made a success of whatever job he has undertaken, one who stands high with the fraternity of which he is a member.

In case of a vacancy in the secretary of state's office, Governor Patterson could pay the press of the state no higher compliment than to appoint Hal Hoss, now his private secretary, to the vacancy. At the same time he would be making an appointment that would be popular in many other circles. He would be making an appointment that would bring strength to his administration. He would be making an appointment that would assure continued business efficiency in the state office probably next in importance to his own.

SWEARING IN VOTER.

A proposed constitutional amendment that will be on the ballot at the special election June 28 that is deserving of approval is the one that would require voters to register in advance of election and would do away with swearing in votes on election day. Voters have become so careless about registration, knowing that they could swear in their votes at the polls, that it often happens that election officials spend more time swearing in votes than in the actual work of conducting an election. In the last election in one county 30 per cent of the votes were sworn in at the polls.

Our election laws are strict in every way except that one and any one who has the qualifications required to be a voter should have sense enough to register beforehand and should have interest enough in the welfare of his government that he will be qualified to participate in an approaching election.

Swearing in votes at the polls has increased at such a rate that it has become almost a scandal and a disgrace and those who believe that the privilege of an election is something worth while, something to be preserved, guarded and protected, will act favorably upon the proposed amendment and awaken the voters who would continue to exercise the right of franchise. Twenty-nine states of the union long ago did away with swearing in votes at the polls and Oregon may well follow their lead.

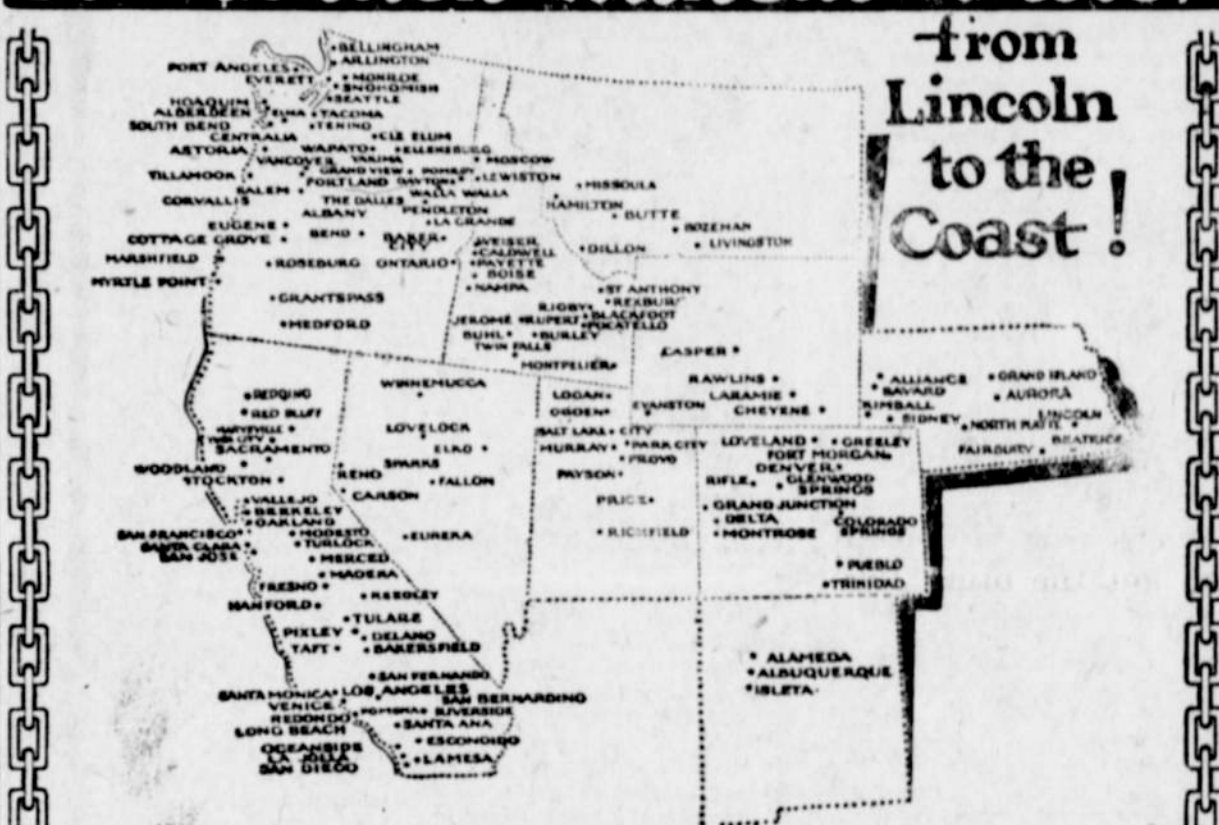
