sides to the question, seriously exaggerated. Under the financial difficulties in which the state is involved, The Sentinel, which never has opposed the principal of income tax, finds it easy to accept the Patterson proposal for a mild income tax that will reach all the people.

The principal objection The Sentinel has always had to income tax proposals has been unfair discrimination against the big income, the high exemptions and the high graduated schedules.

The Sentinel has not yet been fully convinced that graduated schedules are any more justifiable for an income tax than for a property tax, but the low schedules of the Patterson proposal make it practically a flat income tax, and the low exemptions make the tax applicable to practically all who would pay sufficient tax to warrant the cost of collection.

While The Sentinel has not been convinced that the state will go to the demeriton bow-bows if income tax is not enacted, yet it believes that the condition of the state is likely to be improved by the enactment of this mild taxing law.

The condition of the commonwealth is likely to be improved because for one year at least a greater amount of tax money will be produced, which is the principal reason that income tax is again before us. This additional money is needed to carry forward state projects, is needed for the support of our institutions, is needed to keep Oregon abreast of its sister states.

The condition of the state will be improved because a large proportion of those who pay taxes on real property believe that they are being unjustly burdened and that income tax will relieve them. They will be made happier and more contented, and a happy and contented people are needed if we are to build a great state.

The condition of the state will be improved because a large number with large and small incomes, who are now escaping taxation entirely or pay only a small proportion of what they should pay, will begin paying their fair proportion and will have a new interest and a healthier interest in their government.

While we haven't a copy of the measure before us, our recollection is that the boost in the tax levying base provided in the income tax measure is for one year only. This means that after the first year income tax would automatically reduce property taxes unless the base should be raised by another measure that will be on the ballot.

While a proposal to increase taxes is not popular, yet it remains a fact that the people have voted normal schools, a tuberculosis hospital and other things requiring the expenditure of state moneys that cannot be supported unless there is a permanent boost in the tax levying base. The measure that will be on the ballot would add something like a mill and a half to state taxes.

If we wish our state institutions properly supported, if we want a new state building, which is needed; if we want new buildings at the university and at the agricultural college, where they seem to be greatly needed; if we want our state to appear as well as her sister states, we must boost the tax base.

If the tax base is boosted, and income tax is adopted, the property tax for state purposes will remain about the same as it is now.

If the tax base is boosted and income tax is defeated, the state will be provided with sufficient money without income tax, but there will be an additional tax on property. Even then the tax on property will not be increased in mills over what it would have been had not Governor Pierce, without rhyme or reason, caused a reduction several years ago in the property tax levy for the purpose of forcing income tax onto the people.

To sum it all up, we're not in a bad way, but we should look to the best interests of the state. In our opinion the best interests of the state will be promoted by passing income tax and by also boosting the taxing base.

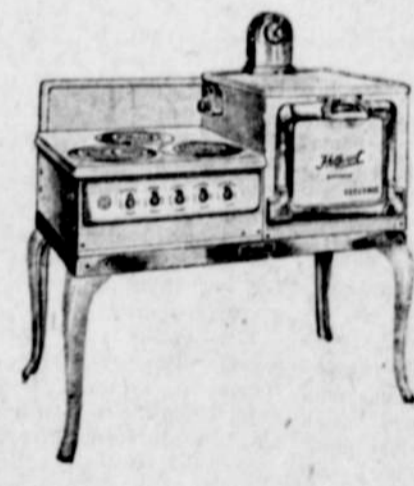
