Mrs. Silas M. Titus Dies Suddenly Monday

She Was Grandmother of Harry Titus and Crossed Plains in 1852.

Mrs. Georgetta Howard Titus, widow of the late Silas M. Titus, and one of the few women who saw Eugene in its inception more than 75 years ago, died at her home in the Taylor-Elliott apartments at 11:05 o'clock Monday morning.

Stricken with acute gastritis at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, the aged pioneer lapsed into a state of coma and passed peacefully away. Her life had been one of excellent health.

Mrs. Titus came to Lane county in 1852 from Baltimore, Maryland, crossing the plains with ox teams. She was married in 1857 to Silas M. Titus, at the original site of Cottage Grove, a quarter of a mile from where Creswell now stands. Her father named the place. Shortly after the wedding they moved to Eugene and lived here ever afterward. Mr. Titus died 12 years ago.

Two children were born, both of them deceased. Alice Clementine, the daughter, married John O'Brien. Mrs. H. H. Stapleton of Roseburg is their daughter. John Andrew, the son, was the father of Dr. Harry Titus of this city and Mrs. Alice Akers of Klamath Falls.

Funeral services probably will be Wednesday at the Venth chapel, with interment in the Masonic cemetery.

Mrs. Titus was in good health Friday, attending to business in the city that day. The estate includes the Titus building at Ninth avenue and Willamette street.

DeAutremont Twins Are Captured in Ohio Town

STEUBENVILLE, Ohio, June 9. (U.P.)—The last of the DeAutremont brothers are under arrest here. Two men known in Steubenville as the Winston brothers were taken into custody last night. At first identification was indefinite but later, officers said, the two admitted that they are the DeAutremont twins who, with a younger brother Hugh, now on trial in Jackson county, Oregon, are accused of dynamiting a Southern Pacific train in the Siskiyou mountains of Oregon in 1923, killing four men. Officers said Ray declared, when arrested, that he would shoot the officers like dogs if he had a gun. The

captives were checked closely against descriptions of the DeAutremont twins and officers said the two fit the descriptions perfectly, even to gold fillings in their teeth.
