### Millions Greet Lindy In World Metropolis

NEW YORK, June 13.—(U.P.)—Three weeks ago Charles Lindbergh left here alone to fly to Paris. At 12:23 today he returned as he left, in a plane, with this exception that there were 20 planes at his side and instead of a handful of followers to wave him farewell, New York's millions were out to welcome him as never was mortal welcomed before. Lindbergh flew here from Washington in an army plane.

Lindbergh was brought to the battery on steamer Macon through a line of saluting boats and beneath arches of water thrown into the air by fire boats. When he landed, thousands at the battery could not be restrained, surged through police lines and massed about the automobile carrying the aerial hero. Two hundred mounted policemen charged full tilt at the crowds but it took them five minutes to clear a place ahead of the car.

Hour after hour went up from Broadway as a sequel to the undesirable din which had marked the progress of Lindbergh on the boat up the bay. Lindbergh kept smiling and waving to the crowd. With his mother, Mrs. William Wooten and Mrs. James Walker he reached the city hall at 2:10 p. m. and was greeted by Mayor Jimmy Walker.

### Regulation Municipal Utilities Is Considered

#### Cottage Grove Water System May Be Regulated by State Commission.

A move to regulate public utility service of municipal corporations in communities outside city limits may be started by the public service commission. An opinion that such municipal utilities should be so regulated has been expressed by Louis E. Bean, chairman of the public service commission. Should the commission take such action, the Cottage Grove water system would be affected.

Regulation of municipal utilities is attracting wide attention among public utility operators and state officials as the result of the lively encroachment of municipal electric and water organizations on territory outside of city limits.

In the belief of Commissioner Bean, city taxpayers lose with the expansion of municipal utilities, as they have to bear the cost of construction, operation and maintenance of the extensions and the expense, if the venture is a failure, devolves on the taxpayer in the city. The outside consumer would be without recourse in adjustments if the public service commission did not regulate the corporations, according to Mr. Bean.

Earl Fisher, tax commissioner, has asked the attorney general to advise him as to the extent of his authority to assess and tax public utilities property owned and operated by municipal governments. The tax commissioner believes that public utilities that come within the purview of the public service commission also come within his jurisdiction.
