Judge Barnard Opposed To Salary Amendment

Points Out That Salaries in Lane Are Smaller Than In Other Counties.

County Judge Barnard, ever since the legislature passed the bill to amend the constitution regarding the salaries of state and county officers, has been opposed to it. The bill was referred to the people and comes up at the election next Tuesday. The measure as it will appear on the ballot reads as follows:

"Submitted by the legislature—state and county officers' salary amendment—Purpose: to amend article XIII of the constitution of the state of Oregon so as to require that the compensation of all state and county elective officers shall be provided by law, but no salary of any such officer shall be increased during the term of office for which he shall have been elected."

Judge Barnard's statement follows:

county officials knowing what

their salaries were when elected and that they should not be allowed any raise during their term, and I notice that the state grange and our chief executive have gone on record as endorsing the amendment of article XIII of the constitution of the state of Oregon, which would probably defeat any salary rise in the county or state offices in the future.

"Being a county official myself, I realize that I am in a poor position to comment on this question, but I will take my own office, for example. During my first term of six years, from January 1, 1921, to January 1, 1927, the valuation and population of Lane county increased nearly 50 per cent, and, due to the market road law and the heavy bond issue in addition, the duties and responsibilities about doubled, but I had a feeling myself that I should carry out my term without asking for an increase in salary, and did not do so, although some of the other salaries were raised.

"At the last election I made no effort to be reelected, but whenever the subject was brought up I made it plain that whoever was elected, Lane county should pay a reasonable salary to its officials, as compared with other counties. I think it would be very unwise to say to state and county officials that, regardless of the increase in the business transacted or the value of their services, no increase in salary will be allowed.

Five counties outside of Multnomah pay their county judges \$2,400 per year each. Lane county, where the duties and responsibilities are at least equal and probably a great deal heavier than in any of these counties, pays \$1,500 per year, and the judge, with the commissioners, must assume the responsibility for the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars each year under the most difficult conditions, besides taking care of the probate, poor, juvenile and other matters which are continually before him.

"Whether the taxpayers favor a rise in the salary of the present officeholders or not, it would surely be a mistake to pass a law which might compel members of the county court, who had served faithfully for years, to accept a less salary than a new member.

"What we need to keep up with the present demands without increasing taxation, is competent officials who can keep the affairs of the county on a sound financial basis and get the best possible results for the money expended. We are a large corporation and are entitled to and should be willing to pay competent officials a reasonable salary.

Cloudburst Takes Toll Eastern Oregon Towns

ARLINGTON, Ore., June 27.—(U.P.)—Residents of this section are today checking up on damage resulting when a cloudburst struck here Sunday evening. Arlington was the scene of the principal damage. Milton and Weston, 100 miles to the east, also suffered heavy property losses. A wall of water seven feet high crashed down on Arlington after the cloudburst hit seven miles south of here. A deluge descended on Milton and Weston following a severe cloudburst in the nearby mountains. So far as known there were no injuries or deaths but the property damage, including crop loss, is expected to reach half a million dollars.

OAKLAND AIRPORT, San Leandro Bay, Cal., June 27.—(U.P.)—One or two trans-Pacific flight attempts may start from here today. CALIFORNIA MAY HAVE WORLD'S RUBBER MART

SAN PEDRO, Cal., June 26.—(U.P.)—This port bids fair to rank among the rubber marts of the world.

When the British motorship Silverlarch docked here recently she carried six thousand bales of rubber, the largest single shipment of that staple ever brought to a Pacific coast port.

The rubber, consigned to southern California manufacturers, was valued at approximately \$500,000. It weighed 1,200,000 pounds.

The Silverlarch's cargo, loaded in Java and the Straits settlement, included copra, coffee, vegetable oils and other products of southern Asia.
