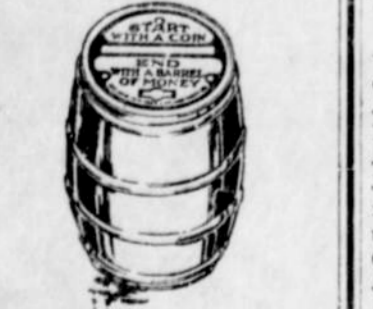

Weekly Tax Turnover.

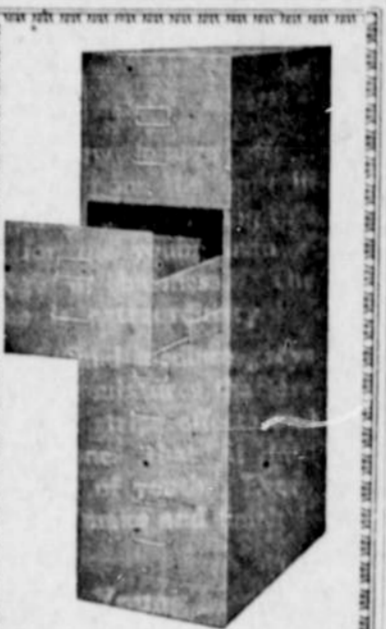
County tax collections totaling \$170,199.98 were turned over to Grace Schiska, county treasurer, Monday by Sheriff Frank E. Taylor. The turnover is the last for the first half collections this year and delinquent tax collections for each year since 1913 with the exception of 1914. The turnover for this year was \$133,098.04.
