COMMANDER BYRD THIRD TO JUMP THE ATLANTIC

PARIS, June 30.—(U.P.)—For the third time within a few weeks the Atlantic has been crossed by an American plane. The naval radio station at Cherbourg has announced the receipt of a message from Commander Byrd giving his position at 12:30 p. m. off the English coast over the Bristol channel. He expected to sight land within a few hours.

LONDON, June 30.—(U.P.)—Commander Byrd established radio communication late today with stations on French and British coasts and asked for his exact position off British coast.
