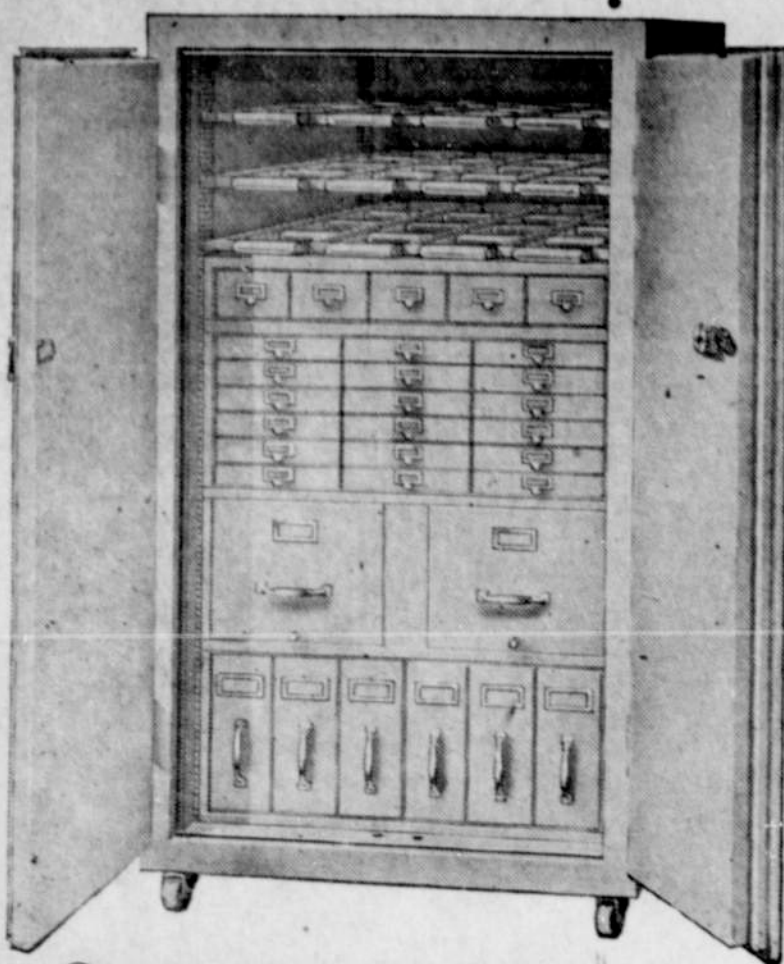

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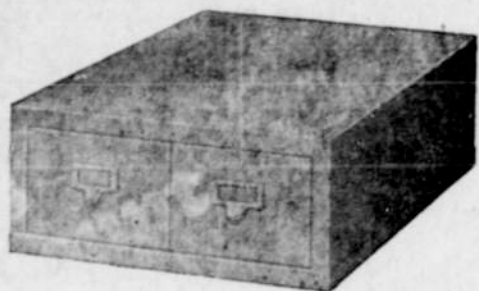

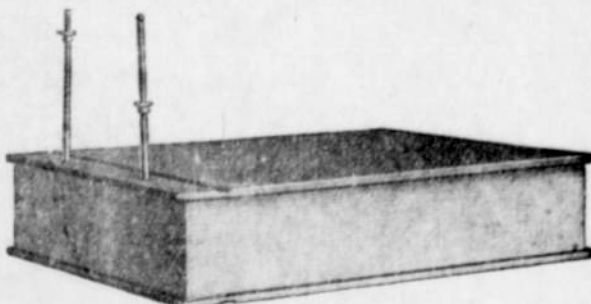

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Southern Pacific Aid For Inter-City Bridge

Springfield Forces Action by Closing Street Leading to Old Structure.

Financial assistance from the Southern Pacific in building the new Eugene-Springfield inter-city bridge across the Willamette river is believed assured through action of the Springfield city council Wednesday night in adopting a resolution favoring closing the dangerous Second street crossing of the tracks at Springfield.

An explanation of the situation by officials of the state highway department and members of the county court prompted the action of the Springfield council.

Since the bridge project was first developed it has been understood that the closing of Second street would bring about financial aid on the new span from the railroad company, to which the elimination of one of the most dangerous crossings on this division would be of great value. According to County Judge C. P. Barnard, the state public service commission will determine the amount which the Southern Pacific will pay toward the new bridge.

When the new bridge is completed, what is said to be the longest single-span bridge west of the Mississippi, and a structure which has seen hard usage for nearly 35 years, will be abandoned.

Game With Coyote Sunday.

The Cottage Grove baseball team has scheduled a game with Coyote to be played Sunday afternoon on Delbert Kelly field. The locals, after a layoff of several weeks, easily defeated Oakridge in a game here Sunday. Cottage Grove will play a return game with Albany on July 24. Alley to Be Paved.

A petition for paving the alley which starts alongside the new I. O. O. F. building and runs through to Washington avenue was received by the city council Monday night. Unless there should be a sufficient remonstrance, this will be added to the year's street building program. Work already has started on the contract let to Stein brothers two weeks ago.

Pipe Organ Now in Use.

A grand opening for the Leathurby-Smith pipe organ, installation of which has just been completed at the Arcade theater, was held last night. Standing room was at a premium for the first performance of "Tell It to the Marines," and the house was comfortably filled for the second performance. Sixty Die as Result Of High Temperature

NEW YORK, July 14.—(U.P.)—More than 60 deaths have been reported from over the United States as a result of the two days' heat wave which continued unabated to day throughout the east. Two deaths were directly due to drowning or lightning and the others were attributed directly to heat.

The west and middle west found some relief today from the torrid temperature but promised showers materialized only at a few points in the east. Deaths for the 24 hours ending at noon today included: New York and New Jersey, 13; Chicago, 10; Buffalo, 2; Philadelphia, 3; Detroit, 2; Baltimore, 3; Ohio, 10.
