Civilians Are Off to Be First to Hawaii

Ernest L. Smith and Emery B. Bronte Leave Oakland in Monoplane.

OAKLAND AIR PORT, San Leandro Bay, Cal., July 14.—(U.P.)

The civilian challenge to the once conquered Pacific airway began at 9:39 a. m. today after one false start had caused a return to the mile and a quarter runway of the small monoplane piloted by Ernest L. Smith. He made a perfect departure from the field on the second attempt and arose slowly, ascending to about 700 feet before the silver gray wings of his plane faded from sight in the haze over San Francisco bay. With him was Emery B. Bronte, navigator and holder of a shipmaster's license. They hoped to be the first civilians to be successful in a flight from San Francisco to Hawaii. Their second hope was to lower the time in which Lieutenants Lester J. Maitland and Albert F. Hegenberger made the flight. The army flyers, first to span the distance, landed in Hawaii 25 hours, 49 minutes after their departure from this air port.

Nine minutes after the plane, "City of Oakland," disappeared into the haze it headed back toward the Oakland air port and circled the field, descending to an altitude of 200 feet. The head of Bronte appeared through the window of the cockpit. He waved to the crowds, who cheered, and then the plane, sweeping gracefully around, headed once more for the bay entrance, gaining altitude rapidly.

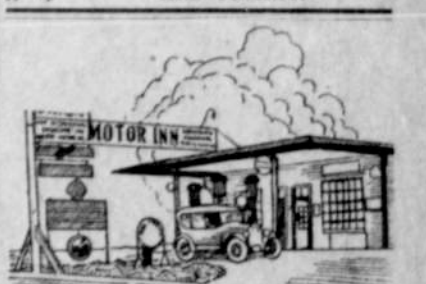
Surviving relatives are the husband and two brothers, John and Christopher Johnson, who live in eastern Washington.
