Electrified Cables Are To Guide Men of Air

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—(U. P.)—Electrified cables under the ocean and across land to guide airplanes on long journeys is the vision of David W. Dickie, prominent marine authority.

Dickie's proposal has been given to the Pacific cable companies for consideration.

By using the electrified lines, aviators would be able to maintain direct routes to their destinations, Dickie contends. Furthermore the lines would function satisfactorily in event of storms, whereas radio beacons might fail.

The plan would make it possible for fliers to find their way easily to small islands and also would take away the present objection to floating landing places in the ocean which is that aviators would be unable to locate them, Dickie said.
