PORTLAND, July 21.—(U.P.)—Emery Olmstead, former president of the defunct Northwestern National bank, and J. E. Wheeler, former president of the Telegram Publishing company, which recently was disposed of at a bankrupt court sale, are both free today on bonds of \$15,000 each, following the arrest of the two on charges of conspiracy to misapply \$796,415 of funds of the bank.

**Thyroid Trouble Found Cottage Grove Schools**

Thyroid trouble is present among school children of Cottage Grove to such an extent as to bring the suggestion from the United States department of health that precautions should be taken to protect those not yet affected. The department conducted a survey here during the past school year and the report of the survey has just been received by C. E. Frost, city health officer. It shows that of 207 girls examined a slight tendency toward thyroid disturbance was found in 51 per cent. Of 197 boys examined the tendency was found in 31 per cent.

The health officer will cooperate with the state board of health, the school board and others interested in an effort to supply a treatment. Thyroid trouble, he says, should not be treated except under proper medical supervision, otherwise more harm than good may result.
