 \$3 AUTO FEE.

The attempt to reduce auto license fees in Oregon to a nominal figure continues and we probably shall have the opportunity at the next general election to vote to reduce them to \$3 for any and all makes of cars.

There are several features of such an attempt that need to be considered and no voter should act hastily. There should be a large vote, for there are few who do not boast at least a lizzie.

Each one of us wants to pay as small a fee as possible. That is human nature. The total reduction probably would not pay our gasoline bill for more than a month or two, yet a reduction in what we pay the state seems like a big thing, while what we pay to a gasoline dealer does not worry us, probably because it is not in the form of a tax, and also because we have nothing to say about how much we shall pay a gallon for. If we could by our votes reduce the price to a penny a gallon, the author of such a measure would gain popularity enough to elect him to the presidency.

The feature about a flat tax, whether of \$3 or some other figure, is that the fellow with one of Henry Ford's bedbugs would pay the same fee as the fellow with a \$10,000 triple six. It would be legislation in favor of the wealthy, just as was the constitutional amendment that took household goods off the taxrolls.

However, this unfairness to the little fellow might be, and probably would be, overcome by the fact that automobiles would go back

onto the tax rolls. This same move would make the tax on autos in many cases greater than under the present system, so that the tax collecting bodies would be the gainers. The assumption is that the tax on gasoline would be boosted sufficiently to offset the reduction in the license fee. It is a favorite pastime to suggest a reduction in license fee and a boost in the gasoline tax. The theory is a beautiful and plausible one too. Under such a plan each user of the roads would pay in proportion to the amount he used them, and the collections from tourists using our roads would be much greater.

But—
 What would the seller of gasoline in Portland do for business with gasoline a nickel or a dime cheaper across the bridge in Vancouver, or the gasoline merchant in Ontario, with the price a nickel or a dime cheaper across the river in Payette, or the service station at Hood River, with gasoline a nickel or a dime cheaper across the river at White Salmon? If we are to consider retailers of gasoline, we must keep our tax in proportion with that across state boundaries. With a nickel or a dime added to our gas, ocean gasoline bootleggers could do a thriving business selling the volatile fluid to owners of benzine buggies in our coast cities.

What about the constitutionality of an exorbitant gasoline tax? Those familiar with the quirks of the law are of the belief that a gasoline tax can only be collected so long as it can be designated a polling and maintenance tax. When it becomes high enough to become a source of revenue it probably would be unconstitutional.

What about our road bonds that are guaranteed by auto license fees? They would have to be paid by a tax upon property, and those who want an additional tax on property are considerably in the minority, as the recent election demonstrated.

And what about a continuance of the road building program? The funds for this also would have to come from a tax on property.

Those who invite a \$3 license fee are simply inviting a lot of trouble and added taxation in some other form.

DIET FOR A MAN.

Tomatoes, corn and peas are the correct dishes for wives to feed their husbands, if said wives would have said husbands contented and good natured. This is on the authority of no less a person than Mrs. Breta L. Greim, expert dietitian. Under no conditions, says Mrs. Greim, should husbands be fed heavy dishes, such as meat.

We presume that Mrs. Breta Greim has practiced on Mr. Breta Greim until she has worked out this formula. It would be interesting to have Mr. Breta Greim brought forth as exhibit "A." We should very much like to inspect the exhibit and see whether the diet has made him a contented and happy home body, or whether he has become so weakened by the scientific experiment carried on in his stomach that he has ceased to resist the wifely efforts of Mrs. Greim to develop for him a perfect diet.

We trust that Mr. Greim does not follow the well known example of that famous mule that up and died at the moment of the successful conclusion of an experiment to teach the mule to thrive on a diet of sawdust.

Tomatoes, corn and peas have their place, an important place, in the dietary program of any well regulated home, whether happy and contented or otherwise. When the season is on, and the mayonnaise is just right, this writer has no material objection to a meal of sliced tomatoes, provided that no expert dietician has told him that that is the kind of meal he ought to eat.

Peas from our own garden, picked when they are the tenderest and cooked with a good grade of lactical fluid furnished by a contented member of the genus bovine, have an appeal for our palate that is irresistible; and roasting ears, when picked in their prime, cooked with the husks on and liberally smeared with creamery butter after the husks have been removed, are a dietetic piece de resistance, provided company is not present and the supply of napkins is sufficient, but we don't want any expert dietician telling us that we have to eat these things.

And we'll wager a year's subscription to the greatest family journal of the Willamette valley, the name of which modestly forbids our mentioning, against anything of equal value that there wouldn't be a contented and happy husband in this world or the next if they were told that they had to confine their diets to these things that appeal so strongly to them when they think they want them.
