Egyptians Leaders in**Manufacture of Linen**

That the manufacture of linen was known thousands of years ago to the Egyptians is proved by the cerecloths or wax-covered winding sheets of the most ancient mummies that have been found, since these were made of linen. Pharaoh arrayed Joseph in vestures of fine linen in 1776 B. C., and that was nearly 4,000 years ago. The garments of the priests of the Egyptians, as well as those of ancient Hebrews, were of the same fabric. Many varieties of flax are known and more than 25 have been cultivated, but the plant is said to rapidly exhaust the soil, and so its cultivation suffered severely except in Egypt. There the fibers of this product were manufactured in very early times and the secret was carried to Tyre in 588 B. C. From Tyre the Phoenicians carried the secret of working flax to Europe and tradition is that the Irish were among the first to get it. As one of the products of Egypt, flax is referred to in the book of Exodus. To this day Egypt cultivates large quantities of this product.—Detroit News.

Medicine's Early Days

It takes little to make history. Until the time of Bressot, a French physician of the latter part of the fifteenth century, it was the practice of surgeons to bleed their patients on the opposite side of the body on which the soreness was felt. Bressot, however, expounded a theory of bleeding close to the seat of the hurt, and so rapid became the discussion among the learned men of the period that Bressot was banished from the empire by Charles V. But not for long, though, for upon the death of one of the emperor's relatives who had been treated according to the old theory, he recalled Bressot and his theory for some time carried weight.

Coast Guard Cutter**Bear to Be Retired**

Famous Ship in Service Fifty Years; Rescued Greely Polar Expedition.

OAKLAND, Cal., July 25.—(U. P.)—The old coast guard cutter

Bear, probably the most famous of all the active ships of the United States navy, is soon to be retired from sea duty and, according to word from guard headquarters in Washington, will hereafter be used as a receiving ship, an ignominious ending to a career of fame extending over a period of 50 years.

The Bear is to be replaced by the Northland now at Oakland fitting out after completing her maiden voyage from the east coast. The Bear started her career in the part of the Arctic in which McMillan is now working when she was secured by the United States to go into the ice between Greenland and the North American mainland in search of the ill-fated Greely polar expedition. The Bear effected the rescue and for a long time held the record of having penetrated closer to the north pole than any other vessel.

For more than 50 years the Bear has been operating in the Bering sea, winning fame for the coast guard service in many rescues and cruises marking her long service. Borings taken of her timbers show the oak to be almost as sweet as the day the timbers were laid down in the Scotch shipyard more than half a century ago.

But police, after hearing his appeal, patted him on the back and told him to "run along and stay sober."

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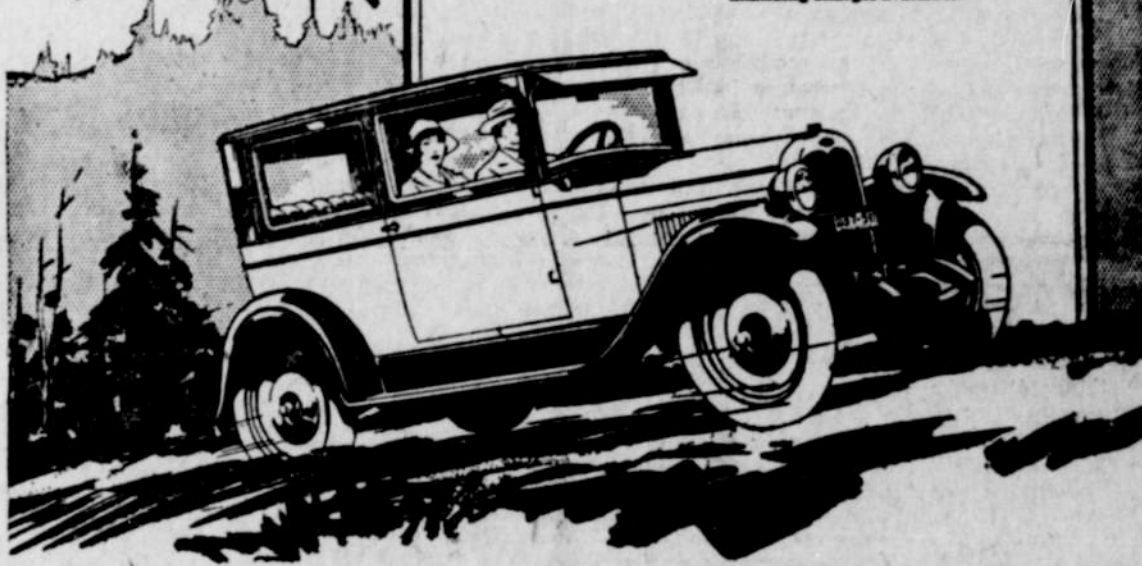
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
