**"NO-PARKING" SIGN**  
RESISTS DESTRUCTION

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—Annoyance over the acts of careless motorists in breaking "No Parking" signs, caused the inventive genius of Vincent Spath, Portland electrician, to flame and he designed an unbreakable post to be used for such signs.

The post has a heavy spring at its base and if a sharp blow from a speeding car knocks it flat it will spring to an upright position again unharmed.

Spath invented the post after he had been forced to labor long and hard in replacing broken "No Parking" signs at the place where he is employed. It has attracted the attention of city officials, however, and Captain Frank Irvin, head of the traffic department, is testing it with a view of installing similar signs on all downtown streets to eliminate heavy replacement costs.

**Two Federal Agents Killed.**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—Two members of the crew of a United States coast guard cutter were killed and two were injured in a bloody battle with rum runners off the Florida coast late yesterday, according to word received here today. It is reported that two of the rum runners were wounded. The rum runner was sunk 32 miles off the Florida coast by the guns of the cutter, the report states.

**Congressman Warns Aliens.**

HOQUIAM, Wash., Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—Congressman Johnson today issued a warning to aliens that participation in demonstrations in behalf of Sacco and Vanzetti would preclude any chances of gaining citizenship. Demonstrations, several of serious aspect, have been held all over the world as a protest against the sentence of death imposed on the two condemned men.

**Portland Bandit Dying.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—Arthur Rogers, bandit, is dying as the result of a gunshot wound received last night in an attempted holdup of a service station. L. O. McCluskey, filling station operator, shot the bandit in a duel but was shot in the elbow by Rogers.

**Sacco-Vanzetti Defense Falls.**

BOSTON, Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—The first attempt of the defense to save the lives of the condemned radicals, Sacco and Vanzetti, failed today when Justice George Sutherland of the Massachusetts supreme court refused the defense attorneys a writ of habeas corpus and a writ of error. Every attempt is being made to save the lives of the two and sympathizers all over the world have been staging demonstrations in their behalf.

**Rising Humidity Checks Fires.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—Rising humidity, less wind and the efforts of several hundred forest fire fighters are helping to check forest fires in Oregon and Washington today. The increased moisture in the atmosphere has been especially helpful in the area from Tacoma south to Roseburg. Forest fire in the Columbia national forest, Washington, jumped the Columbia River Saturday night and burned 160 acres in the Herman creek district near Mount Hood. The fire is almost under control and if weather conditions improve forestry officials believe the fire will be checked.

**UTICA, Aug. 8.—(U. P.)**

—One man was arrested here in connection with the bombings which caused bad fires in the Italian district.

**Auto Parking Prohibited.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—Parking of automobiles on streets adjacent to the federal building and the United States post office was prohibited in an order issued today. The order is a precautionary measure.

**Portland Judge Generous.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—"By golly I think a 15-day stretch in jail would help me get off the booze," was the declaration of Frank Gallagher when he appeared in municipal court.

But Judge Stadter was in a generous mood and doubled the required "thirty days," he said. "But 15 days is enough," protested Frank.

"Maybe so," said the judge, "but 30 days is what you get."

**Lorane Road Widening Starts.**

Grading has been completed on the territorial road south of Lorane and the road crew under direction of A. E. Davis, district supervisor, is starting work on the widening of the road between Lorane and Cottage Grove. About one-half mile of this road will be widened and rock placed, according to Clinton Haral, county commissioner. Mr. Haral recently inspected the site where a 90-foot bridge on the Boggs road will be moved. The change in location of this span will provide a shorter route to the Pacific highway for a number of residents of the Harrisburg district and they will defray a part of the cost, the Lane commissioner states.
