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SHALL AMERICANS RULE AMERICA?

We hear a great deal about the influence of wealth on the courts of the country. Delays in justice and defeats of justice through the use of great fortunes have been disgusting and have brought our courts into disrepute, but the power of wealth has accomplished nothing that has not been accomplished in the case of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, found guilty of the cold murder of a paymaster in Massachusetts more than seven years ago.

The names of the two are suggestive of an underworld power that has brought fear to many and this fact may have had much to do in influencing courts and executives, but more than that has been the untiring efforts of radicals of the world to bring to the defense of the pair every legal technicality that could be invented and to make every appeal that could suggest itself to the most imaginative mind.

Even Mussolini and others in foreign countries have taken a part in trying to save from the electric chair the two whom those in a position to know have said were fairly tried and were honestly found guilty of a foul murder. No two criminals have had greater opportunity to defeat justice, yet the first refusal of the governor of Massachusetts to grant a stay of execution was characterized as extremely brutal. Attorneys for the defense said that the governor and his advisors would have to justify themselves by reason and not by partisan fiat.

To us at this distance it seems that there has been a use of reason by the prosecution and rather a lack of it by the defense.

There seems no doubt that the pair are guilty of a brutal murder of a person who had done them no harm but had the misfortune to be the custodian for the moment of a large sum of money. How about cruelty to this innocent person? How about cruelty to those who held the murdered man dear? Charges of brutality come with poor grace from those who seem without question to be responsible for taking a life for a few paltry dollars.

Out here in the west the senti-

ment is that the two Italians have had more than a fair trial and that courts and executives have catowed to the power of an underworld society and have acted as though in great fear of reprisal by those who have come to our shores from foreign shores to enjoy the rights and privileges of citizenship in this great land of the free and home of the brave.

This is a test, it seems to us, of whether justice shall prevail and whether Americans shall rule in America. We believe that Americans and justice will win.
