The plan is to leave here immediately after 1 o'clock. Every resident is asked to go.

Two other prisoners in the same part of the jail refused to take part in the break but aided by remaining silent until the night jailer made his rounds and found the yawning hole.

Those who escaped are Emmett Bailey, 36, condemned to hang for the murder of his wife last January; M. E. Roberts, 25, a negro with a long criminal record and held on a robbery charge, and A. J. D. Burke, 41, who was being held for trial on a statutory charge.
