City Council

The regular meeting of the city council Monday night was devoid of high lights.

Engineer Colner reported on request for extension of sewer south on Fifth street to the Golden Rule auto camp. He made several suggestions as to how sewer connection might be made, but all were at such expense that action was postponed pending investigation as to whether a sewer district might be formed against which the cost might be assessed.

City Health Officer Frost, in response to instructions from the council, reported on investigation of sanitary conditions at the Mrs. Clara Young home on Second street and said that he believed it the council's duty to see that the property is cleaned up. Reporting on a fox farm on Quincy avenue, he said that the condition there now is not serious but thought that it might become so during the breeding season. He said that the owners seem to be doing their best to care for the situation. What action the council should take was not suggested and none was taken.

The city property committee was authorized to accept a gift of iron standards for auditorium seats from the Arcade theater, to purchase bottoms and backs for the standards and install the seats in the council chamber.

Miss Lela Currin and N. E. Glass were reappointed members of the library board.

The street committee was authorized to rent the city's steam roller to Anderson & Middleton at \$150 the month, straight time.

fire-proof boiler room. They are fed from overhead directly into the fire box. The hole through which the sawdust drops is small enough so that a person so inclined couldn't commit suicide by dropping through the hole, although this may not have been the reason they were built small.

"We haven't the equipment we ought to have," Mr. Woodard informed his guests. This wasn't apparent to the guests, who were of the opinion that about every time-saving and labor saving device possible was being used. The mill is the only one known to Mr. Woodard having an arbor set in roller bearings. Only one refuse carrier is used, but this is so arranged that it cleans the whole mill.

It was difficult to get the visitors to leave their position near the big saw, where a "nigger" tosses and pulls the big sticks around at will. The guests noted that the big building was not jarred by tumbling around the big timbers. The reason is that it is solidly set on reinforced concrete. Herbert Eakin wanted to see 'em stretch one of the big saws. Most of the guests thought Herbert had forgotten himself and was springing a joke, but Herbert hadn't and wasn't. But the saws aren't stretched by pulling. They are placed so that they swing around over an anvil and the stretching is done by hammering the metal.

The model bunk houses and cook houses showed the change that has come over the sawmill business within a few years. Both were spotless, and the men can keep the same way by patronizing the shower baths, where hot water is provided. In the cook house the diners can listen to the same music over the radio as the millionaire in his castle.

Road May Be Oiled.

If good weather prevails for at least a week there will be another coating of oil placed on the Springfield to Walterville section of the McKenzie highway, according to Raymond Walsh, resident engineer of the state highway department. This oiling will be a "seal coat" to bind the surface and it is expected that it may take about four days to cover the 11-mile stretch of road. The oil will be placed and gravel laid immediately so there will be no interruption of traffic. At least a week of good weather to dry the road will be necessary before the equipment is brought from Salem and the oil from Portland for the work.

September Rain Is 4.17 Inches.
