Damocles Rightly Has Small Claim to Fame

There is probably no weapon in all history that is better known than the "sword of Damocles," as it is usually called. It was not the possession of Damocles at all. He would not have had it at any price. As a matter of fact it belonged to Dionysius, the cruel, vindictive and suspicious ruler of Syracuse in the Mediterranean, three or four centuries before Christ.

It is one of the strangest things going that this ruler's playful trick of asking Damocles to dinner and hanging this sword over his head by a single hair, should have come down to us through the centuries so that every young writer now uses it to point his moral and to adorn his tale. Two or three classic poets referred to it, and everybody who could use a pen has been referring to it ever since—people who, like Pickwick's fat boy, have a desire to make our flesh creep.

The Damoclean sword is continually hanging over us in one way or another. Poor old Damocles, who was nothing but a subservient and flattering dinner-out, had no idea that he would be so well known as he is. In his own day he didn't even have his portrait in the paper. It was a queer way of convincing a hanger-on that he was a bore.—Vancouver Province.

Christian Names All Had Their Meanings

Amos, the name of one of the minor prophets, is, of course, Hebrew. It means strong, courageous. Albert is from the Latin, Albertus, meaning nobly bright, illustrious. Kenneth is from the Gaelic, meaning a leader, a commander. Luke is from the Latin, Lucus, and the Italian Luca. It is the name of the "beloved physician," the author of the Third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. Meredith is a Celtic name, meaning sea-protector. Miles is Latin for soldier. Norman is Teutonic, meaning a Norseman or Northman, that is, a native of Norway. Henry is from the Old German, meaning the lord or chief of a house. The name, with small changes, appears in many languages, thus: Heinrich, Latin: Henri, French; Enrico, Italian; and Enrique, Spanish. Lewis, from the Old German, or Louis in French, means bold warrior. James is the same as Jacob, the latter being of Hebrew origin, meaning supplanter. The Latin form of Jacob is Jacobus, and the French Jacques, and the Spanish Jacoba, Diego, Jago, Jaime, all meaning James or the Hebrew Jacob.

Sardine's Foe

Hunting the tuna fish was formerly done to protect the sardines, which they devour in large numbers, but since the tuna is now popular for food, it is the basis of an important phase of the fishing industry. In the Mediterranean, says Popular Mechanics Magazine, the tuna are detected by watchmen who sit in chairs on high extension steel ladders on the coast and relay word by telephone when a school of fish is sighted. By means of sardine bait the fish are lured into a bay called the "death chamber." This chamber is a square inclosure of heavy netting which is closed at the entrance when a number of fish have been caught in it. Then the men, working from a boat around the net, kill the tunnies with spears.

Palms or Willows

In olden times cakes and flowers were thrown down from the church tower amongst the people on Palm Sunday, followed by a procession march of choristers and clerics bearing palms. There are many entries in the old church accounts for money spent in buying "cakes and palms." There has been much argument as to what the "palms" really were. It is unlikely that they were real palms, except possibly here and there in connection with the more elaborate ceremonies held at the great cathedrals. In the villages and smaller towns it is probable that branches of the flowering willow were extensively used, and this would account for the prevalence of these trees in country churchyards.

Choice in Chess

In the number of possible moves chess stands alone among games, and not only is it safe to say that no living being has ever made, even once, every possible move, but it is highly improbable that in all the centuries of the history of the game has every possible move been made. The different ways of playing the first four moves on each side are so numerous that if every man, woman and child in a city of 500,000 population were to set to work playing them night and day, it would be more than a year before any one would be able to leave the chessboard.

Ninety Gallons Alcohol Taken in Liquor Haul

for Remanufacture.
Believed to Have Been on
Way to Northern Cities

The biggest haul of alcohol ever made by Lane county officers was made at Eugene Tuesday evening, when Melvin Turnbull, deputy sheriff, confiscated an automobile containing 90 gallons of the liquor and arrested the driver who gave his name as George Gimble.

The alcohol was contained in five-gallon cans and 18 cans were taken. The rear compartment of the car, a coupe model, was almost completely filled.

The arrest was made as a result of investigations under way for some time, Deputy Turnbull said. When Gimble drove into the city at 5 o'clock, the officer was on east Broadway waiting for him.

Gimble, it is alleged, obtained the alcohol in California and was on his way to deliver the cargo in Portland and Seattle. It is not believed that he intended to deliver any in Lane county.

After being delivered in Portland, officers said, the alcohol would have been used in preparing "bonded" whisky and gin.

Gimble gave his age as 27 years and his occupation as produce merchant.

School Testing Methods To Be Up at Conference

School Heads and Teachers to
Hold Meeting in Portland
October 14 and 15.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—All school principals and teachers of Cottage Grove and the state at large will be invited to attend the conference on diagnostic testing, to be held at the public library in Portland Friday and Saturday, October 14 and 15, it is announced by the school of education of the University of Oregon, which will have charge of the session.

The specific subject of the conference will be testing methods in use in the schools of Portland and of the state, and this will be supplemented by data from schools in other parts of the country.

"Testing in Oregon Schools" will be the topic of J. O. McLaughlin of Corvallis and around his report will center much of the discussion. W. A. Dixon, principal, Portland, will deliver a talk on "Diagnostic Testing and Remedial Teaching in Arithmetic."

Two features on the meet will be the lectures by Worth McClure, Seattle, noted expert on diagnostic testing, and the explanation of the educational service bureau of the University of Oregon, by C. L. Huffaker of the school of education.

Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon, will preside at the first day's session, while C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools, will preside October 15.

This will be the first step in furthering the work of the educational research bureau of the University of Oregon, the work of which will be fully explained.
