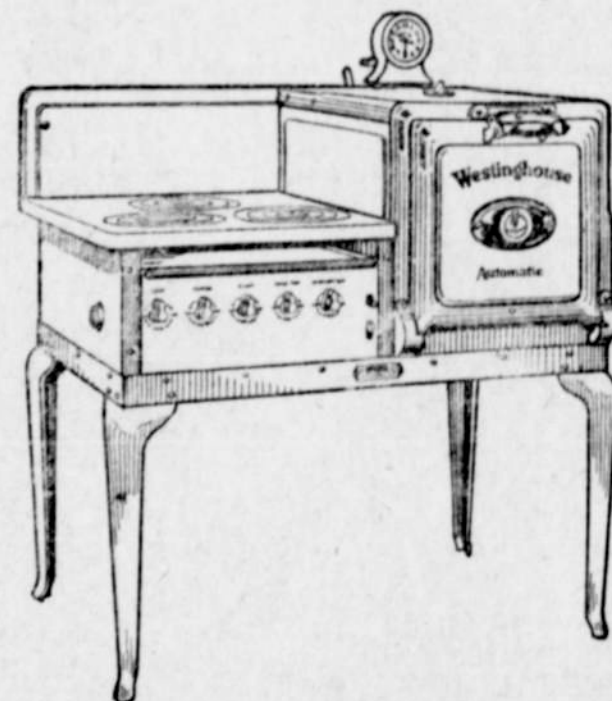
Then they become indignant at courteous requests for settlement. It is decidedly unpleasant for all concerned.
