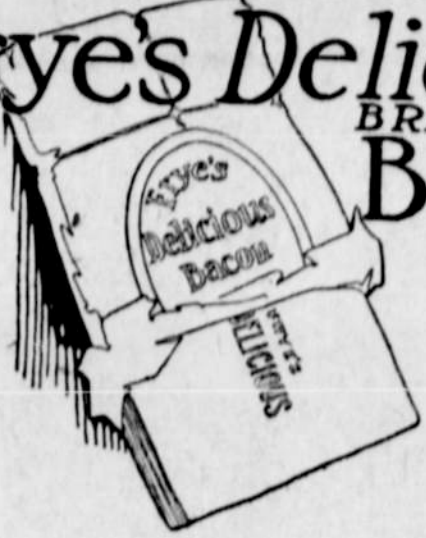

COUNTY IS OBLIGATED ON FAIR DEBT, IS VIEW

Although the law is not quite clear as to whether Lane county is responsible for the deficit of between \$1300 and \$1400 incurred by the county fair this year, it seems as though the county is obligated to pay this sum and probably will do so, according to Clinton Hurd, county commissioner.

If the county pays the deficit, as now seems probable, it is certain that future regulations of the county fair by the court will be shaped so that this will not occur again. Mr. Hurd said, in commenting on this unforeseen deficit that probably will have to be cleared by action of the court.

Mr. Hurd sees the value of the annual county fair but declares his belief that this event should pay its way each year after the county's annual appropriation is made. The county this year allotted \$2000 to the fair. Attendance at the fair this year was not up to that of other years and the prize list was longer than at first anticipated by the management.

MANY TOOLS STOLEN FROM COUNTY JOBS

Loss of tools and other bridge and road equipment from county projects is becoming serious and a reward of \$100 has been offered by the county court for information leading to the conviction of the guilty persons.

A report was made Wednesday that the tool house at Hayden bridge had been burglarized during the night and a considerable quantity of tools taken.

The lock on the tool house and also the lock on the tool chest inside the building had been broken. Recently a forge and anvil were taken from a county tool house and frequent thefts of gasoline from county jobs have been reported.

"The loss to the county is serious, as a crew of men will appear for work on a job and find the tools gone. This means that sometimes a whole day will be lost while new tools are being sent to the job, while wages of the men goes on and work is delayed," said Clinton Hurd, county commissioner.

RAILROAD BRIDGE BEING BUILT AT A. & M. MILL

Arrangements for the early construction of a new railroad bridge for the O. P. & E. at Latham are being made by Anderson & Middleton. Pat Murphy, civil engineer for the company, was here Thursday to work on the plans. The O. P. & E. supplies the company's big mill at Latham and the railway is now on one side of the Coast fork and the mill on the other. Logging in the Culp Creek timber is going on but some difficulty has been encountered and for the present a small loading crew is working logs from a left-over cutting above Rajada.

Government Gets Back Naval Oil Reserves

Decision of Supreme Court Is Against Harry Sinclair, E. L. Doheny.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 10.—(U.P.)—Teapot Dome's millions of barrels of oil will revert to the government, the United States supreme court today announced. This terminates the lease of the Wyoming oil field granted to Harry F. Sinclair's Mammoth Oil company.

This decision brings to a successful close the government's long battle to regain two rich naval oil reserves leased by former Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall in 1922 and 1923.

E. L. Doheny's lease of the Elks Hill reserve in California has been annulled by the supreme court and President Harding's executive order giving the interior department jurisdiction over navy oil has been revoked by President Coolidge.

CAMP COOKING TAUGHT TO BOY SCOUT TROOP

Arnold D. Collier, county club leader, instructed troop 1, boy scouts, in camp cooking at the Friday night meeting of the group. The troop went to the golf links, where under the supervision of Scoutmaster Baker and Mr. Collier the boys built fires, mixed the ingredients for biscuits and learned the art of baking a biscuit on the end of a stick over an open fire. About 30 were present. Mr. Collier had car trouble coming from Eugene, making him late in arriving, so that it was 11 o'clock by the time the group completed their program and reached their homes.

The troop drilled at Veterans' hall before going to the golf links. Practice on bugles was postponed until the coming Friday. The boys are gaining proficiency in the work, according to Mr. Baker, and several are ready to take their second class tests in scout work. Several are taking up signal work and signal stations between the Baker place and the Hawley place west of the city are being planned. The troop now has a full membership of 32 and several are on the waiting list.
