MONTANA COUNTY AGENT ASKS FOR LANE STOCK

Lane county dairy cattle are in demand from other states, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, who has received a letter from H. C. Burgess, county agent at Twin Bridges, Mont., asking the cost of 10 or 12 Guernsey heifers shipped to that place. He said a farmer in that county (Madison) wanted to buy young animals bred to freshen this winter, besides a good registered bull. He wanted none but high grade stuff, the letter stated.

Mr. Fletcher said that Lane county farmers who have such dairy cattle to sell may communicate with him.
