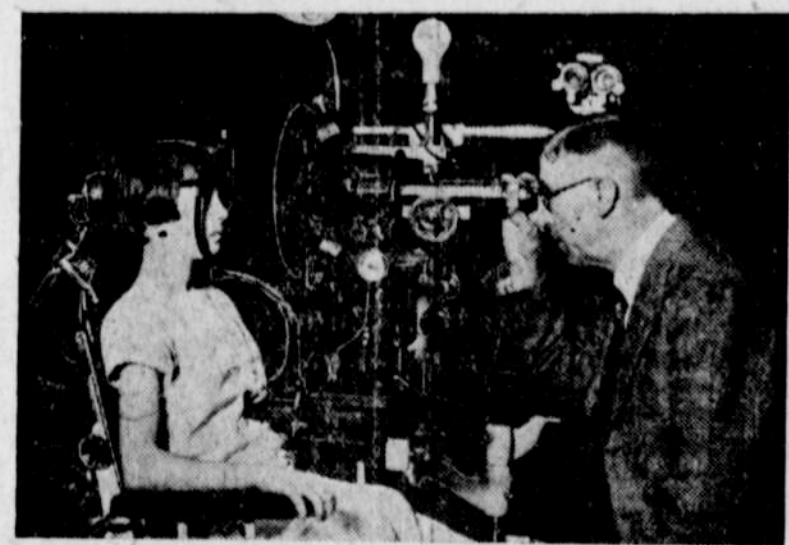

How Sentinel wantads sometimes pay for themselves many fold is told in a communication from Jack Howard.

"I placed a little for sale in our issue of the 20th: 'Three-year-old cow, now coming fresh, for sale.' I beg to say that the ink was hardly dry on your issue before I received inquiry, and on the 21st I sold the cow. A peculiar thing about the sale is that previous to the publication of the advertisement the best offer I had was \$15 less than the price I received as a result of the ad in your paper. Personally I am convinced that 'It pays to advertise.'"

As the ad cost two bits, the advance in price of \$15 paid for the ad sixty times.

COUNTY HAS NO FUNDS FOR M'KENZIE PROJECT

Lack of funds in the Lane county treasury for its part in the construction of the Springfield-Thurston section of the McKenzie highway may delay that work for some time, according to County Judge C. P. Barnard.

Lane county will have to provide for half of the cost and pay for the right-of-way, but Judge Barnard says there is no money on hand to do it.

The state highway commission is said to be anxious to begin the project.

"Lane county is more anxious to see construction begun on the Willamette-Florence highway than on the McKenzie," the judge said.

Paralysis Claims Victim

The second death from infantile paralysis in Lane county this fall occurred Saturday when the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lyle A. Redick, residents on the Elmira road near the Southern Pacific terminal at Eugene, died after a short illness. The first death occurred a few days before.

No other cases of the disease have been reported and conditions in Lane county are not believed to be serious.

Late President Is Remembered.

Under these conditions there is less danger of fungus growth and other diseases.
