LEGALIZING IMMORALITY.

Some of the discussion of the recent appearance in the state of Ben Lindsey, who, in our opinion, needs the services of a first class juvenile judge not afraid to tell him what he needs to know, leads to the conclusion that those conducting the discussion believe that in some way Judge Lindsey proposes to make moral by law what is now considered immoral.

We don't believe that Lindsey has any such silly notion, as much as we may disagree with his ideas on companionate marriages. The moral issue is not one that can be affected by legislation.

It is not many years ago that houses of prostitution were permitted by law in many communities, but there is no one to claim that they were moral institutions then and immoral now that the law has driven them out.

A few years ago saloons were permitted, today they are not, yet drunkenness, so far as it is a moral issue, is no more reprehensible now that it is forbidden by

law than it was when permitted by law, and to rob a man of his senses and his family of food by plying him with liquor was just as much a damnable thing when saloons were permitted as it is now when the moonshiner and the bootlegger skulk in the darkness.

The law says that a motor vehicle shall not be driven in Oregon at a greater speed than 35 miles the hour, but there are few whose consciences bother them when they drive at a speed of 40 or 45 miles, and so long as their consciences don't rebel it is not likely that they will be halted by Saint Peter to make explanations. There is no moral issue so long as life and property are not more endangered than they would be at a lower speed.

Lindsey's "take-em-home-on-approval" proposal may be, as many claim, hardly a step in advance of what we now have, but we have not expressed our approval of what we already have, therefore are free to disagree with the peppy former juvenile judge, despite semi-approval of the Lindsey doctrine by some mothers, priests and prelates.

But whether we approve, or whether we don't approve, the moral issue will remain the same and one in which our consciences should be able to guide us aright.

Taxes Delinquent November 5.

Tax collections are picking up at the office of Sheriff Frank E. Taylor on the approach of the time when unpaid assessments become delinquent. November 5 is the last day for payment of the second half of the taxes, payments being delinquent after that date. The big rush of taxpayers will be the few days before November 5, Sheriff Taylor states. The large taxpayers of the county do not make payment usually until the last day. Many taxpayers make payment through their banks and these will also come in the last few days.

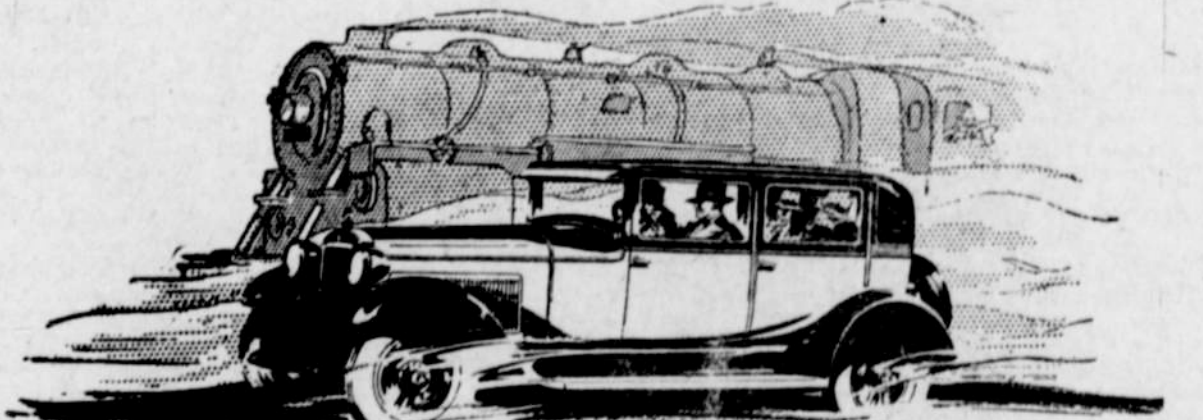
