U. OF O. STUDENTS FORCE TEST AS TO SERENADES

To determine to just what extent city officials would enforce a ban on nocturnal serenades in the residential district near the University of Oregon campus, students of the university staged a serenade early Saturday morning and then turned in their own "complaint" to the police.

Fifty-six students pleaded not guilty to disorderly conduct and will be given a jury trial Friday.

A week before a serenade was stopped by night police who claimed that the noise was disturbing residents in the neighborhood. Last week the students appealed to Mayor A. L. Williamson, who told them that they could play at night as long as they stayed on the university campus. As soon as they started playing in the residential districts the law against noise after midnight would have to be enforced, they were told.

CHARLES TUBBS GIVEN TEN-YEAR SENTENCE

Charles Tubbs, 53, was sentenced by Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth Wednesday to serve ten years in the state penitentiary on a statutory charge preferred by the father of a 13-year-old girl.
