Tax Payments Heavy.

Lane county's heaviest taxpayer, the Southern Pacific railroad company, paid its second half tax assessments Friday at the office of Sheriff Frank E. Taylor.

The check was for \$95,402.72, representing one-half of the tax for the year. The first half payment was made last May. Saturday was the last day for payment of taxes before they become delinquent. The Booth-Kelly Lumber company is the second largest taxpayer in the county. The half-payment for this concern is more than \$50,000. A large number of property owners were at the sheriff's office Friday and the mail also was heavy.

Guy Jones Loses Hand.

As a result of an accident Friday forenoon at the Bohemia Lumber company mill south of this city, Guy Jones, 28, employed as an edgerman, will lose his right hand. He caught the hand in the edger saw, severing it at the wrist. Mr. Jones had reached down to remove a slight obstruction in the way of the edger and as he turned around his hand caught on the saw. He was brought to Cottage Grove for first aid and taken to a Eugene hospital. Mr. Jones is single and had been in the employ of the company for about 8 years.
