Few men are so universally known as Rubens. It appears that his father, Jan Rubens, had a liaison with Anna of Saxony, wife of the great William the Silent, prince of Orange. Pierre Paul was the son born of this illicit union. The child was not recognized by Orange, who subsequently divorced his wife.

The legitimate wife of Jan Rubens adopted the boy. But the puissant family of the Oranges never forgave the young painter for being allied with them by blood. They persecuted him all his life, according to new revelations.—Chicago Journal.
