The Eugene Register gives endorsement to the plan of the district attorney of New York to rid the stage of nudeness by taking the offenders into police court in the clothing of which complaint is made. The Register believes that judges, with the naked truth before them, will do greater justice to the charges against the prisoners. Also, we may add, there will be no dearth of candidates for police judgeships in that state.

The Register says:
It is a curious thing, when you think it over, that public nakedness should be regarded by anyone as all right in a theatre and all wrong in any other public place.

INGALLS IN POLICE COURT.

Claude Ingalls, political Warwick, connoisseur of limbs feminine and editorial, columnist de luxe, pulchritudinous in physical appearance and ugly as a bear with a sore ear when he gets to throwing the editorial vitriol, has come in contact with a limb of the law.
