School Health Survey To Be Directed Soon In McMinnville School

University of Oregon, Eugene.—A complete health survey for the McMinnville senior high school will be made in the near future by the school of physical education of the University of Oregon, it is announced by Delbert Oberteuffer, head of the school. Working in cooperation with F. L. Fagan, head of the McMinnville schools, and George Allison, former student of the University who is director of physical education at McMinnville, will be Carl Rice, senior in the department here, and other members of the University staff.

The survey will be made not only for the benefit of the McMinnville school, but also to serve as a model for surveys of other institutions. Schools desiring this service from the University may confer with Mr. Oberteuffer on the subject, it is stated.

The work will have two distinct aims, it is declared by those in charge. The first direct result will be the mapping out of a program to be followed by the McMinnville school for next year, using the present facilities and the funds to be appropriated for this project. The second will be the outlining of an ideal recreational program, one which the community may work for in years to come.

Many High Schools to Take Part in Debate

University of Oregon, Eugene.—Many Oregon high schools are reported to be enrolling in the Oregon High School Debating League, according to Dan E. Clark, secretary of the league and assistant director of the University extension division. It is expected that about 80 high schools will have enrolled by the end of the time limit, the middle of December. The state has been divided into 11 districts and debaters from each of these districts will vie with one another soon after the Christmas holidays. Winners will meet at the University in May.

COAST ARTILLERY UNIT WINS MOBILIZATION TEST

Pioneer Basketball Team Out.

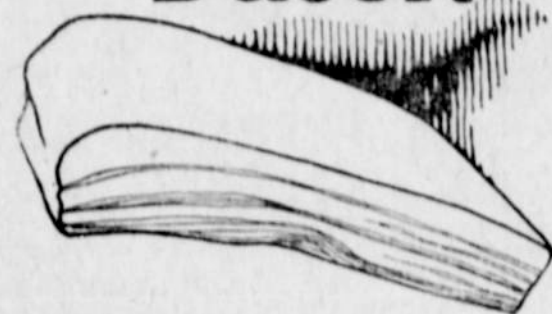
