Buffalo meat was a delicacy of the pioneers, a substantial delicacy often, for cattle were few and meat not on the daily menu. The great herds of millions of the buffalo were decimated and we of today have never dreamed of eating the meat of the pioneers.

But a half breed Indian of western Montana has developed a great buffalo herd and the meat is being put on the market. Bartels market of this city has made arrangements for a carcass, which will arrive about December 15. The head and hide will bring almost as much as the meat. Only a few of the buffalo are sold each year and it is seldom that a carcass is shipped to a city the size of Cottage Grove.

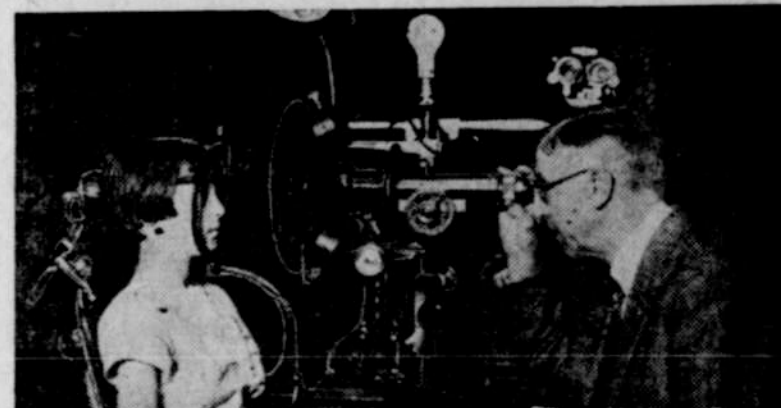
