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A FATHER'S BRAVERY.

We may each of us have our opinion of the D'Autremont brothers, now confined in lonely cells at the state prison paying for one of the most brutal and bloody train hold-ups in history, but we have but one opinion of the attitude that has been taken by Paul D'Autremont of Eugene, father of the lads.

Unlike the boys that are of his blood he has not tried to run away from those who know him, although he could not be blamed for so doing. It has not been necessary for him to do so, for he has nothing to fear from the law.

The price he is paying for the sins of those to whom he gave being would be but little less if he lived where none knew that he was the parent of three confessed murderers, and then he would live in fear, as his boys did, of being found out.

In Eugene, where his home has been for many years, he is known for the upright life he has lived and he need not fear that an urchin of the street will find him out, for they all know him now.

They had a fathers and sons banquet in Eugene recently.

That must have been the last place that a father would want to go who felt that as a father he had been a failure and that as citizens his sons could have fallen no lower.

But this father who has suffered agony from which death would be relief, faced the proud fathers and happy sons gathered around the banquet board—not for the pleasure of the occasion, nor for the associations of the occasion, for he would rather have been alone, but that he might speak from his heart to other fathers with sons coming into manhood, that he might speak to those sons coming into manhood, that he might speak a word to those fathers that might keep them from being the failure that he feels that he has been, that he might speak a word that might keep other sons from bringing to their parents the agony that the D'Autremont boys brought to theirs.

D'Autremont may have been a failure as a father—so are many others of us—but it is a real man—a real father—who will bare his own grief, his own scars to save other fathers from what he is bearing, who will open his saddened heart to save the sons of others from what his sons have done.

In all human history it is not recorded, so far as this writer knows, a nobler deed for the welfare of humanity, a braver deed to save youthful souls.

Teaching Program Of University Is Topic of Meeting

Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall Is Speaker at Session of State Institutions

University of Oregon, Eugene.—The scientific program that is now under way at the University of Oregon, by which a more accurate method is hoped to be found for rating the teaching staff, and through which new and more efficient teaching methods are expected to be found was given nationwide prominence in Chicago recently by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University, who spoke before the American Association of State Universities session on this subject. Two main objectives are sought by the experiments and research work now carried on, declared Dr. Hall. The first of these is an accurate method of determining the actual worth to the University of its professors and instructors, so that promotions and advancements can be made strictly according to merit. The second is for definite improvement in actual teaching methods, so that students may be better trained and better instructed.

Methods now in use at the University of Oregon for personnel work were described to the members present. The first consists of the preparation of a "Who's Who" of faculty members. This includes the complete educational history of the faculty members and lists of his academic performances, all available information about his family, activities in the university, salary increases and promotions and personal impressions gathered by the president from occasional personal interviews.

The second method which is a direct check on the efficiency of the faculty members, is a requirement that each instructor and professor send in his examination questions when he sends in the results, or grades of students. The third is that each faculty member must send in a statement of his objective in giving the course, at the same time that he submits the examination questions.

Parents of Students At U. of O. Engaged In Many Pursuits

University of Oregon, Eugene.—From all classes, occupations, trades, and professions they come—the parents of the university students. There are capitalists and stock men, artists and janitors, doctors and sheriffs, clergymen and stevedores.

Nearly a third of the parents of University students, or 847 to be exact, are engaged in some form of business, according to a survey just completed by Earl M. Pallett, university registrar. Of these 277 are mercantile.

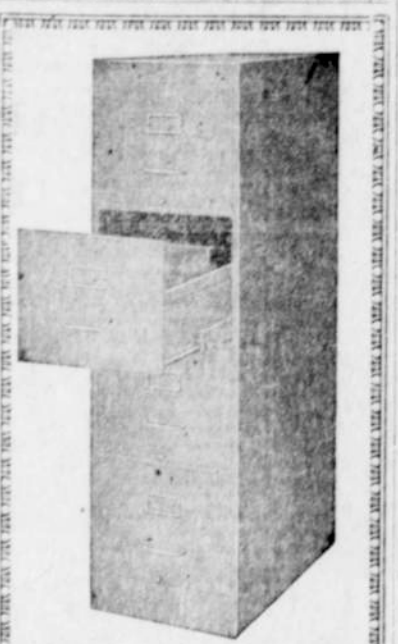
Second on the list of occupations are the various professions. There are 338 professional men and women, including 77 doctors, 38 clergymen, and 24 dentists.

Agriculture ranks third on the list of occupations, with 318 parents engaged in the various phases of farming.

Other list include 20 representatives of the artistic professions, 58 of these scientific professions, 59 railway men, 58 government employees, 110 unskilled laborers, 73 of miscellaneous occupations, and 480 whose occupations were not stated. Some of the occupations listed are interior decorator, sculptor, social supervisor, postmaster, U. S. Army and Navy, justice of peace, sheriff, city manager, shipbuilder, foreign trader, milliner, house mother, editor, barber, bottler, butcher, and timber cruiser.

A NEWSPAPER PROBLEM.

(Ashland Tidings.)

It is necessary for a newspaper to sell a certain amount of space in order to meet expenses and continue to publish. It is this source of revenue that enables the subscriber to purchase the paper at less than cost. Good newspapers as a rule strive to maintain a fixed ratio between advertising and news matter. If the advertising increases beyond this point they increase the size of the paper and the news may keep pace therewith. Metropolitan newspapers actually are forced to put a limit upon the sale of advertising space and various methods are used to prevent advertising from crowding news matter out of the paper—among the methods are prohibitory rates for some classes.

Small city newspapers are not troubled with the problem of too much advertising except on possibly an occasional day, but they are up against the proposition of keeping their news columns up to the proper ratio. If this is meant real honest-to-goodness news, space is eaten up by too much matter of doubtful news value. Whenever an individual or an organization gets a boost in the paper they are crowding out legitimate news and cheating the subscriber out of just that much of the material for which he pays. These so-called boosts do not (as is the case with paid advertising) help to make a cheap paper for the subscriber. They are of little interest and of no value to anyone except those directly affected. They are the only part of a newspaper which does not do its share toward either financing the publication or repaying the reader for his subscription price.

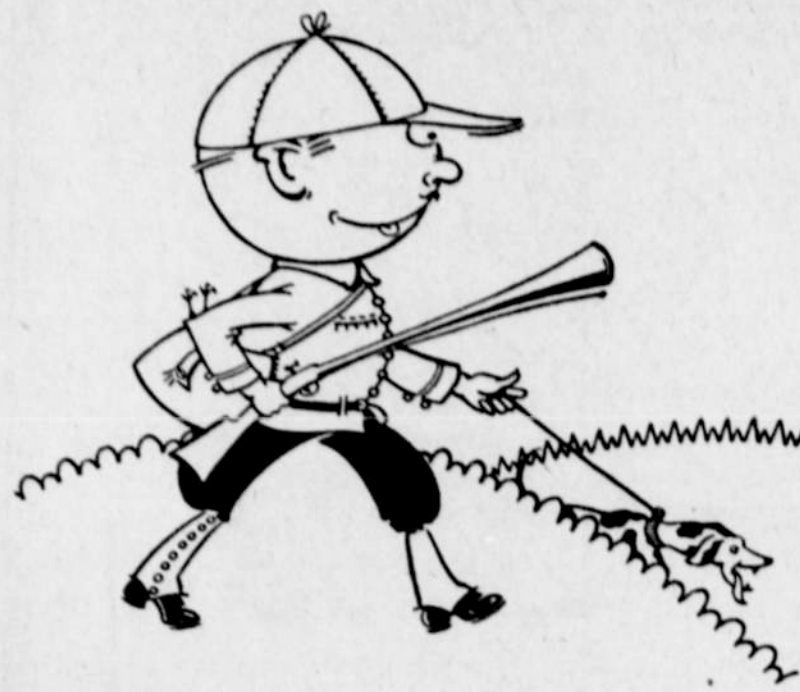
That is why the editor is glad to accept paid advertising or news matter which will interest or inform his readers, but he deems to see the appearance of propaganda or booster articles. He likes to please folks, but he feels he is betraying both his readers and his mission when he uses up space for things of little or no interest or value to the readers and which add nothing to the support of the publication.
