The city budget for 1928, carrying items totalling \$28,000, was adopted Monday night without a taxpayer being present for the meeting, with the exception of members of the council and one or two others who attend council meetings. The attendance of councilmen and visitors was smaller than usual. Not a member of the budget committee, outside of members of the council, was present.

Series on Paul Started.

Pastor Duncan P. Cameron started a series on Paul at the midweek prayer service Wednesday night at the Presbyterian church, taking as his subject "The Mediterranean World in Paul's Day." A large number attended.

Pastor Cameron dealt with the sources of information concerning Paul, pointing out the fund of information in the Book of Acts and in Paul's Epistles. He showed how the conquests of Alexander the Great unified the known world and prepared it for Paul's coming. He spoke of the Jews of Jerusalem and of the dispersion, of emperor worship and of the mystery cults.

A meeting of those interested in aeromantics will be held tonight in Legion hall for the purpose of organizing a local aero club. One object of the club would be to provide a landing field here.

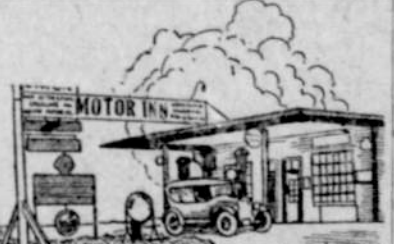
