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NEWPORT SCHOOL ANARCHISTS.

We criticize our schools and our school kids a great deal. Possibly incidents at Newport, Ore., will show us that criticism should be directed elsewhere.

The news dispatches tell us that 40 parents of school children of that delightful summer resort were to appear at school this morning and direct their progeny to remove their school books and leave the school until such time as the county school board shall remove a woman principal and install a male principal.

It is possible that something has to be done to direct attention to Newport during the winter time, but defiance of law, advocated by parents, is going too far.

So far as we have been able to learn, the complaint against the woman principal is that she wears long skirts, has long hair and is old-fashioned. The charges are serious enough to warrant action of some kind, but defiance of school law seems to this humble writer to be fully as reprehensible as the deceit practiced by the wearing of long skirts. Long hair is again coming back, and we should be willing to take some old-fashioned teaching in preference to some that is said to be up-to-date.

Of course, there is such a thing as being too old-fashioned, just as there is such a thing as being too up-to-date.

Children in high school should not be taught that there is a Santa Claus and that the goblins will wreak vengeance on naughty boys and girls.

But it would not be too old-fashioned to insist that kids learn their arithmetic so thoroughly that they could do a sum in simple fractions, during their senior year in high school; it would not be unforgivably old-fashioned to insist that English be so thoroughly drilled into them that in high school they will be able to make use of what was taught them in the grades.

Above all, it would not be too old-fashioned to teach them that obedience to law is the first thing to be learned, in school or out.

These 40 parents who went to school this forenoon to direct their children to disobey law are, no doubt, too up-to-date to know that they are subject to arrest for their act. They may be too up-to-date to know that the authorities can invoke the truancy law and bring back to school the kiddies that the parents have taken away with such a flare of trumpets.

This is dependent upon the kiddies being yet of school age, which their actions easily indicate that they are.

A few years ago we voted to compel attendance at public schools of all children. Parents were not to be permitted to send their children to parochial schools. Now we are confronted with the proposition of whether kiddies shall be compelled to attend any school, and whether parents shall say whether or not their modern offspring shall attend school.

Shall children and parents obey the law, or shall they not?

That is the first question to be settled.

Let the law take its course.

EUGENE'S BUDGET ELECTIONS.

While the narrow margin by which Eugene has voted its school budget, at the third election held for the purpose, is not entirely a protest against the rising cost of education, yet that factor was a prominent one, of which fact the newspapers of that city have taken due notice. It is the feeling that we are paying good money for things that do the kids little good that causes dissatisfaction.

We are not going to go backward in education, but the following quotations from an editorial in the Register are significant:

It is probable that many people voted for the budget under protest. That fact is indicated rather clearly by the large adverse vote. These people balanced their dissatisfaction against their loyalty to the ideal of good schools, and loyalty to the schools won.

One source of dissatisfaction is to be found in the fact that for several years expenditures have been outrunning income, resulting in the accumulation of a large current debt. That is bad business. It is always bad business when current expenses exceed current income. Steps ought to be taken at once to correct this condition. A budget should be made that will cover all costs, and this budget should then be adhered to strictly.

The Register also advocates that budgets should be adopted before indebtedness for an ensuing year is incurred.

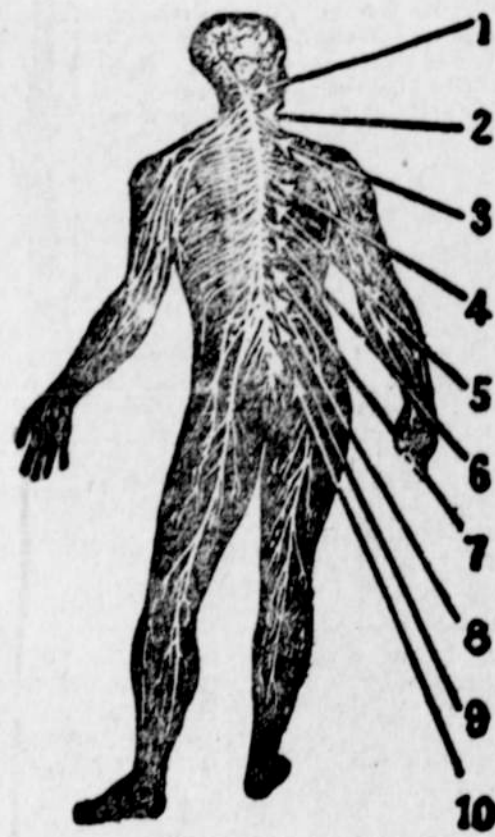
