It is a hard and fast rule of every reputable editorial room that the heading given a story must refer to something in the body of the news story. In Sunday's Eugene Register appeared a story that puzzled us. It was headed, "Body Not 'Headless.'" Nothing in the story told whether or not the body was headless, or gave excuse for such a heading. And why the quotation marks for "Headless"? It chanced that following the reading of Sunday's Eugene Register we picked up Saturday's Eugene Guard. There it was emblazoned in letters two inches high that the headless body of a man had been found. The Register's heading was then explained. The Guard's story was incorrect and the Register had violated a rule of the editorial room to cast reflection on the story carried by the Guard. However, wasn't it complimenting the Guard's circulation when it implied that everyone who read the Register would be familiar with the story in its competitor and would sense the meaning of the heading? Possibly a headless story would have been better. We must have our fun with these metropolitan newspapers.

Of all Christmas editions that reach The Sentinel, that of the Portland Spectator is annually the best of them all. The story of Oregon, its mountains, its rivers, its water falls, its lakes, its sylvan and floral beauties are told in pictures that vie for beauty with the editorials of that sprightly magazine. The number of beauty spots to be found in Oregon is indicated by the fact that in the many Christmas editions the Spectator has printed it has seldom repeated. Every person living outside of Oregon should receive a copy of the Spectator's Christmas edition. After a year or two there would be few left to whom to send the magazine.

tension of a 12-inch water line down Second street, which would be available to supply a large part of the city.

The new line probably would give the city a number of new water users.

Probability of New Industries.

One well known lumber operator of this section has already said that had there been a fire protection line to the industries two years ago his company would have erected a remanufacturing plant on the line. Industries seeking locations always look for fire protection among one of the first things. Industries like to locate where they believe they will receive cordial treatment.

Standard Sesoning Society to Triple Capacity.

Favorable action upon the proposed bond issue would mean that the Standard Sesoning Society would start early in the year the erection of a second sesoning plant, to be double the capacity of the present one. There would be a direct pay roll of \$100,000 in the construction of the plant, not to mention the indirect pay roll of mills that would produce construction material.

The direct pay roll of the sesoning society is not large, but the present sesonous gives the Cottage Grove district a business of about 15,000,000 feet annually which it did not before have, which means the employment of a large number of men, and it is steady employment, for the sesonous is always kept loaded.

A second sesonous of twice the capacity of the present one would mean a total new business for this section of approximately 45,000,000 feet, steady employment for several hundred men and a ready market for the lumber of every small mill within Cottage Grove's shipping radius. Two mills of the size of any Cottage Grove now has would be kept reasonably busy supplying that amount of lumber.

Employees, Protect Your Pay Check.

Workmen, you are the ones to feel first the effect of a shutdown. You know what the present inactivity of the lumber business means to you. Destruction by fire of any one of the mills to which it is proposed to give fire protection would mean throwing several hundred men out of work for several months, even in the event that reconstruction should start at once. You who first feel the effect of lack of jobs can readily visualize what the destruction of the industrial center to the south of the city would mean. Be at the polls on December 30, before 5 o'clock, to protect your pay roll, your pocketbook.

Merchants, Business Men, Professional Men, Protect City's Pay Roll.

You know what this year's unfavorable conditions in the lumber market have meant to you. It is not much trouble for you to visualize what it would mean to you if one or all of the pay rolls of the industries south of the city should be wiped out by fire. A recent fire at Chico, Cal., wiped out a \$500,000 daily mill pay roll and 132 families left the city the next day. Are you willing to take chances on this happening here? Be at the polls on December 30, before 5 o'clock, to protect the city's pay roll.

Property Owners.

A large per cent of the value of your property has been put there by the fact of Cottage Grove's lumber pay rolls. Protection of that pay roll means an ever increasing value of your property. Loss of our pay rolls, even for a short time, directly injures every property owner. Be at the polls on December 30, before 5 o'clock, to protect the value of your property.

Clerks and Employees of the City.

You may not get your pay check directly from the lumber industry, but the Cottage Grove pay roll is essentially a lumber pay roll and it is because of the lumber pay roll that there is a job for you to fill. You would miss the lumber pay roll almost as much as the mill or woods employee. Be at the polls on December 30, before 5 o'clock, to protect your job.
