Ben-Hur First Color Film to Come Here

Cottage Grove will have its first opportunity to see a film in color when Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's \$4,000,000 pictorialization of Lew Wallace's classic, "Ben-Hur," is shown at the Arcade theater Sunday, Monday and Tuesday.

The novel, subtitled "A Tale of the Christ," was the world's most popular book; the stage spectacle toured America for 22 years. Now, in the greater art of the motion picture, are offered the famous sea fight and chariot race as thrilling out-of-doors events, the lovely romance of Judah, prince of Hur, and Esther, and replicas of old world masterpieces, often in color. There are pictured the beautiful procession of palms, the Vine's "The Last Supper," "The Pool of Siloam," the Vale of Hinnom, the Via Dolorosa, the miracle of Christ's healing, the mob and Pontius Pilate and the terrific cataclysm of nature that toppled towers and palaces at the death of Saviour. The final scene with Roman soldiers casting lots for the garments and women kneeling at the foot of the cross is said to be one of the best pictorializations.

"Ben-Hur" is presented with a magnificent cast that includes such stars of the picture firmament as Ramon Novarro, Betty Bronson, May McAvoy, Francis X. Bushman, Carmel Myers, with 150,000 extras in support. Novarro's performance as Ben-Hur is said to be a surprisingly vigorous and dramatic portrayal. Bushman is an excellent Messala and May McAvoy as Esther is wholly delightful.

The picture took three years to film and cost \$4,000,000. Italy and California were the locations used. During the filming 1,900,000 feet of negatives were exposed and from these 850,000 feet were printed. The film editor had to cut this to 12,000, the length of the picture.

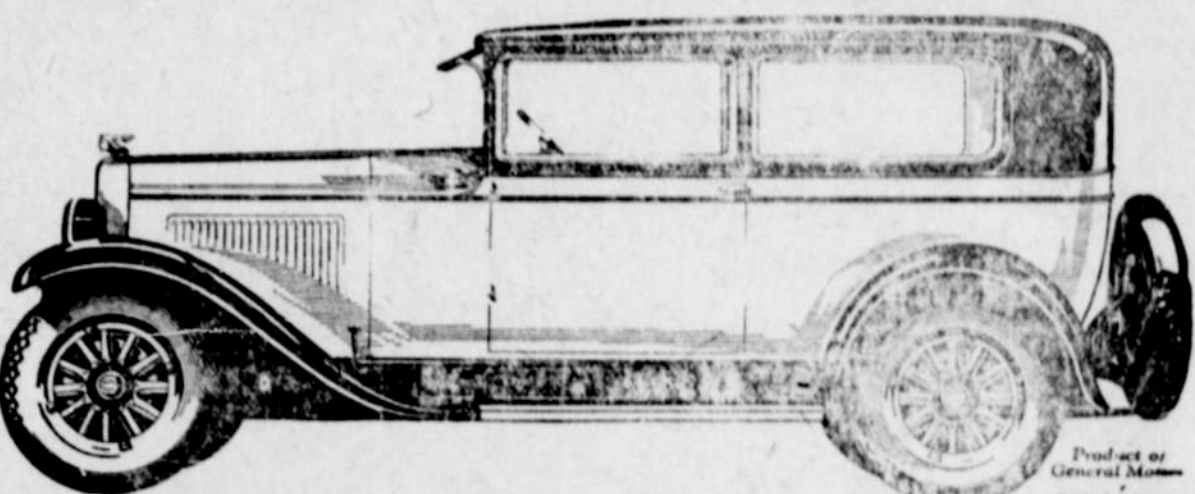
