LINDBERGH WINGS WAY MANAGUA, NICARAGUA

TEMUCIGALHA, Honduras, Jan. 4.—(UP)—Colonel Charles Lindbergh left here today for Managua, Nicaragua, while United States marines only a few miles away were trying to conquer the rebel forces of General Sandino. Lindbergh left in his plane, Spirit of St. Louis, at 11:36 a. m. The distance is 150 miles, but Lindbergh planned to fly west of a direct line so his plane would not be a target for snipers.

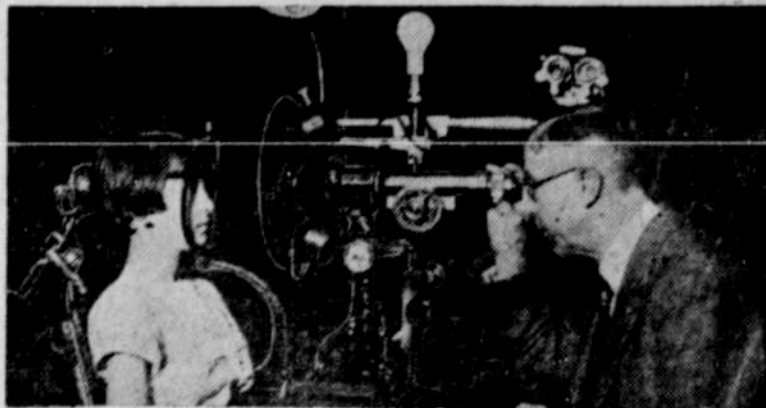
