### PLANE ON ENDURANCE TEST IS FORCED DOWN

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—(U. P.)—Another attempt of Captain Charles Kingsford Smith and Lieutenant George Pond to capture the world endurance flight record ended in failure today. They landed at Mills field at 10:13 a. m., after their plane had been in the air for 50 hours and four minutes. They came down because the gasoline supply became exhausted, after a desperate struggle to conserve gasoline so as to remain in the air long enough to pass the record of 52 hours, 22 minutes, 21 seconds set last summer by two Germans.

### Two Bandits Killed By Portland Cashier

Man Has Hunch That Gun May Be Needed and Uses It Effectively.

PORTLAND, Jan. 19.—(UP)—

Arthur J. Demorest, cashier of the Mt. Scott State bank, shot and killed two bandits when they attempted to hold up the bank today. The bank, located in a residential shopping district about 80 blocks from the downtown business section, opened for business at 9 a. m. Thirty minutes later two armed men entered. Demorest shot, killing both instantly.

Demorest brought his rifle to the bank this morning on a hunch that he might need it. As bandits forced employees toward the vault he seized it and shot the leader through the heart. Swinging around he shot the second robber through the head, while a third man acting as lookout fled toward a waiting sedan. Demorest fired again and it is believed he wounded the third one. According to Demorest, at least four and possibly as many as six were in the outlaw group. The first man killed was identified by Demorest as the leader of two bandits who, on December 29, robbed the bank of \$1900. The inscription, "J. J. Hughes, Eugene, Oregon," was in the tailored coat which he wore.
