Roy Heck, Midget forward, was high point man with 18 counters and his running mate, Cledis Swanson, was a close second with 17. Marcola resorted to rough-house tactics in the last of the second half but the Midgets held a commanding lead and were not hampered.

High School Play Is Put on Indifferently

A fairly large audience was present Friday night for the performance of the high school junior class play, "Doris Comes to Town." The play itself was of a mediocre variety and the acting corresponded. The bright spots in the performance were the characterizations of three minor players, Kenneth Goff as Ted Spratt, the messenger boy, Connie Hutchinson as Betty Brewster and Beth Bailey as Verna Calloway. These three, while their portrayals were not finished, showed more histrionic ability, put more life into their characterizations and better created the illusion of their parts than did the other members of the cast. The others were less sure of their lines and were unnatural in their parts.

The play was the story of a small town braggart, Harold Cooley as Wallie Larkin, who has come to the city to make good his boasts but fails. To maintain his position he writes home of his phenomenal success, his rise from clerk to cheese king. A girl from his home town, Doris Baneroff, played by Geneva Shattuck, appears and to hoodwink her he enlists the help of his friend, Bob Brewster, played by Keith Ward. The scheme fails because Larkin has offended his boss, the real cheese king, Samuel Brewster, played by George Wilson.

The lines of the play were not especially good and the action was slow.

Drill at Eugene Well Is Again in Operation

The drill at the Guaranty Oil company's well at Eugene started downward Friday morning, according to W. E. Morrison, head of the American Petroleum company, which has taken over operation of the well on a contract. Work of clearing the hole was completed Thursday and drilling is now to be continued uninterruptedly. Two shifts of three men each will be used.

An eight-inch bit will be used to hammer aside the casing which was driven into the bottom of the well by a falling block and caused a shutdown in operations. The hole is now at 3107 feet, Mr. Morrison said. The rate at which the drill will go down is not easily determined, he said.

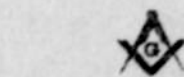
