Venetians First to Restore Fading Sight

After visiting the University exhibition in Rome, with its quaint and magnificent collections, says a correspondent of the *Edinburgh Evening Sun*, there can remain no doubt in one's mind as to the fact that Italy has been the mother of spectacles. Professor Albertotti, a professor at the University of Padua and dean of the oculists of Italy, collected a number of ancient and modern books about spectacles, and illustrated this valuable material in a treatise which he dedicated to Senator Isidoro del Lungo. The latter had attributed the invention of spectacles for short-sighted and long-sighted persons to the Dominican monk, Fra Alessandro della Spina, of Pisa.

But Professor Albertotti whose authority in this matter is unchallenged, is of the opinion that the glory of first making spectacles must be attributed to Venice, the home of glass and pure crystal. From the codex of the "Capitolari della Arti" of the state of Venice, dated 1291, it is found that severe penalties were applied to dishonest spectacle makers who used simple glass instead of pure crystal.

Another document proving the antiquity of spectacles is a portrait of Cardinal Hugh of Provence painted by Thomas of Modena, in the chapel of St. Nicholas at Treviso, in which the cardinal is represented as wearing spectacles.

The minister of education, Signor Fedele, also lent a rare picture by the Umbrian painter, Ilcilio Alunno, representing the Virgin and Child with St. Jerome, who is reading a book with a large pair of spectacles across his nose.

Superior Women Raise Men to Higher Level

In a marriage where the two people are of unequal birth or tradition, it is better that the wife be of superior grade because she is much more likely to lift the marriage and the children to her cultural level, according to Rheta Childe Dorr in an article in *Liberty*.

"An inferior wife," explains the author, "too often drags the husband down, because, alas, the male of the species finds it only too easy to slump. Robert Louis Stevenson noted this among the missionaries of the South seas. The men, he tells us, 'after a few years grow careless of dress and behavior, neglect to shave or bathe, and in extreme cases practically go native. The women, on the contrary, hardly change at all, but after 20 years among natives live, dress and act exactly as they did at home.'"

Knew He Would Help

In a field where Barrie sat thinking out a story there were lambs. One of them strayed away from its mother, turned around three times and was lost. The bleating was terrific. Barrie had to put down his work and lead it back to its mother. Hardly had he returned to his seat before another lamb did just the same. They went on doing it, one after another, keeping Barrie busy taking them back to mamma.

But the wonderful thing was that, after a time, instead of looking for their mother themselves they just came to Barrie and insisted on him finding her for them.

Barrie contends, says Jerome K. Jerome, who tells the story in "My Life and Times," that lambs are much more intelligent than is generally supposed.

Words Most Used

Analysis of business letters, newspapers and ordinary correspondence has produced a list of 50 words said to be used more frequently than any others:

The, and, of, to, I, a, in, that, you, for, it, was, is, will, as, have, not, with, be, your, at, we, on, he, by, but, my, this, his, which, dear, from, are, all, me, so, one, is, they, had, very, were, would, she, or, there, her, an.

The first 12 words make, on the average, 39 out of every 100 words commonly used. The 50 words run 50 to 100 in all ordinary writing. Only one of the 50, "very," has more than one syllable.

Paper-Shelled Nuts

With reference to the pecan, the term "paper shell" has been extended in its application until it is now practically without significance. Originally applied to those types of pecans having such thin shells that one could easily be cracked when two were crushed together in one hand, the term during recent years has been made to include all cultivated varieties, many of which have fully as hard shells as the average wild nuts. Properly speaking, the term "paper shell" never referred to a particular variety; its correct application has been only with reference to varieties having very thin shells.

Battle Over Hickman Jurors Is on Again

Attorney for Girl Murderer
Loses in Two Moves
to Aid Defense.

COURT ROOM, Los Angeles, Jan.

30.—(UP)—The battle over the selection of a jury for the trial of William Edward Hickman was renewed in superior court here today, after defense had suffered two sharp reverses in its legal maneuvers. Jerome Walsh, attorney for Hickman, was overruled in a motion to delay the trial while a committee of alienists, to be appointed by the American Psychiatric association, examined him to determine whether he is sane. Walsh also lost in his objection to further questioning of the jury panel that had been passed by both sides before court adjourned Friday. Walsh asked the examination by a committee of alienists from the institution on the grounds that Hickman is without funds to retain alienists for preparation of an adequate defense.

Mrs. Susan E. Comer Dies.

Mrs. Susan Elizabeth Comer, a former resident, died Sunday at the home of a daughter, Mrs. F. F. Crowell of Springfield. She was aged 78 years. She was born July 25, 1849, in Franklin, O. The husband, W. W. Comer, died eight years ago and is buried here. Surviving relatives are three children, Mrs. I. B. Huckins, Oakland, Ore.; Mrs. F. F. Crowell, Springfield, and Stewart E. Comer, Springfield.

Funeral services will be held at 11 o'clock Tuesday forenoon at the Mills chapel and Pastor John A. Linn of the Methodist church will officiate. Interment will be in the A. F. & A. M. I. O. O. F. cemetery by the side of the body of the husband.

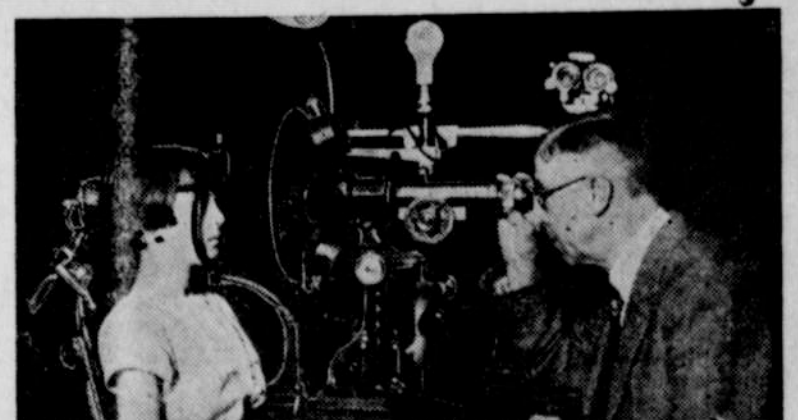
