Northwest Is Producing Quantities Food Stuffs**Business of Canneries Increases Six Fold in Period of Seven Years.**

The northwest is rapidly coming into its own. Only a few favored spots on the globe can boast of the climatic and soil conditions that exist here, and in recent years the tremendous volume of foodstuffs produced has gained national recognition.

This does not include products such as livestock and wool, valued at \$144,073,000, other industries, such as lumber, our biggest pay-roll source; furniture, paper and paper products, clothing, machinery, copper and many other commodities.

If the 1927 figures were available, the sum of our northwest production would amount to many more millions.

One huge outlet for these products is found in the hundred stores operated by Ross McIntyre, known as the 20th Century stores, with headquarters in Portland, and branch stores in 43 other towns in the northwest. Buying for 100 stores at one time makes it possible to place regular and substantial orders with northwest producers, tending to help stabilize home industries.

From the beginning of his career as a distributor of foodstuffs, Mr. McIntyre has done much to encourage food production at home and considers it good business policy to do all in his power to promote northwest pay-rolls. He prophesies a bright future for northwest food producers.

This community was well represented at the hearing of the ex-teacher, Grace Edmonds versus the school board, held at 2 o'clock Fri-

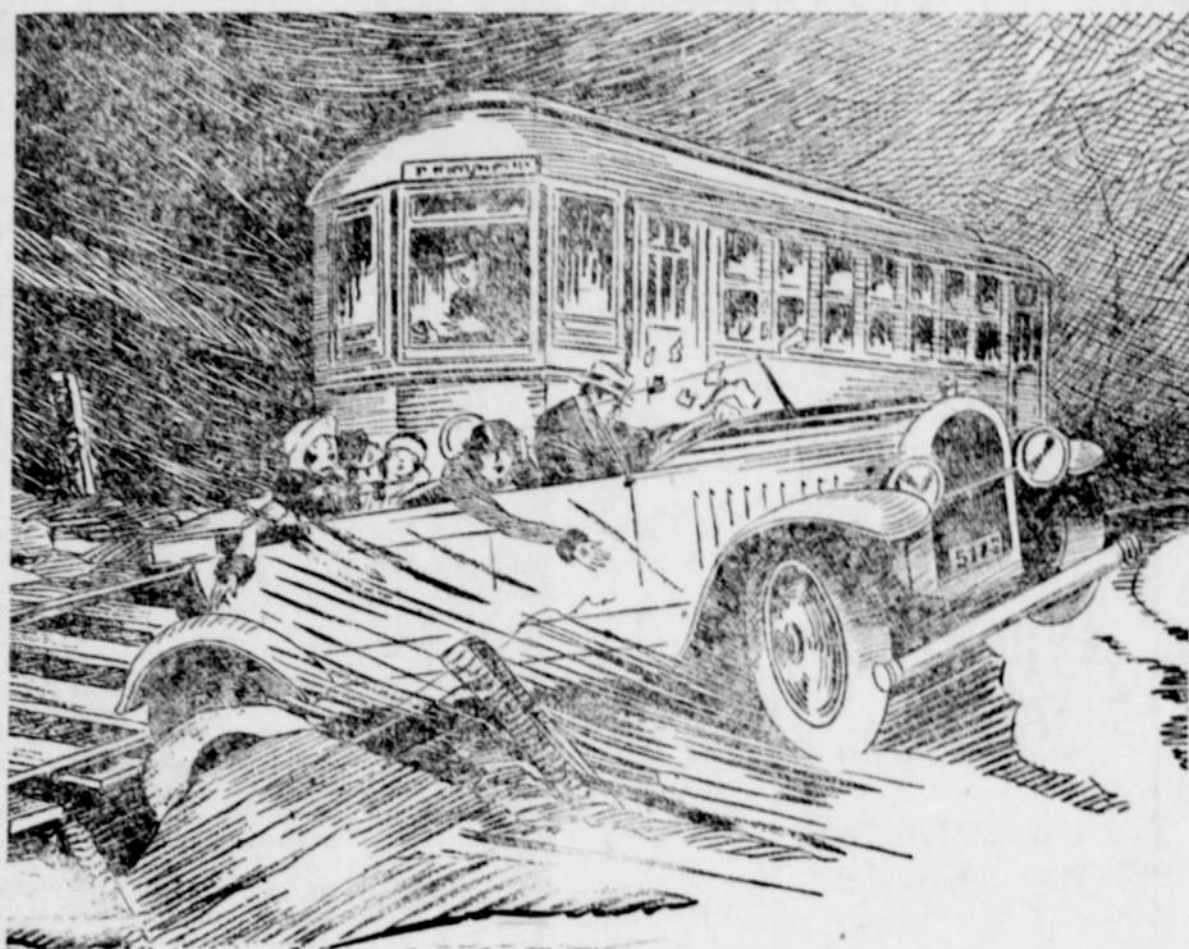
day afternoon in the office of County School Superintendent E. J. Moore in Eugene. The superintendent's decision sustained the board.
