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## PROHIBITION AND PLATFORMS.

Colonel Roosevelt, in discussing prohibition and party platforms recently, said that the republican party must decide to repeal or modify or set about enforcing the Volstead act.

His noted father could have said no more.

Prohibition is certain to be an issue in every campaign until the eighteenth amendment is either enforced or nullified.

It is equally certain that every political party will quadruplexially declare for its drastic enforcement.

The natural thing to do, the logical thing to do, is to enforce the act while we have it. Strict enforcement would either make it popular or unpopular and we should soon know whether or not we want it.

The Sentinel does not wish to be pessimistic and say that no national administration is going to make a serious attempt to enforce it, despite much evidence that such may be the case.

Even President Coolidge has been criticized for laxity in his attitude toward the amendment. He is personally an out and out dry. That much is certain, whether or not he has done his best to enforce prohibition this writer does not know.

If he hasn't, why hasn't he? Or why does it appear that he hasn't? This writer does know this, that prohibition is not going to be a reality in the sense contemplated by the Volstead act until those who criticize the manner in which it is enforced, until those who criticize the police officials of nation and state, until those who would not be contaminated by all the evil that goes with the booze business, until those above being tempted by the opportunities for gain that come to a prohibition enforcement official, are willing to take places on the enforcement squad.

So long as those who believe in prohibition consider a place on the enforcement squad beneath their position in the world, so long as positions on the enforcement squad are left for those who want the jobs, we are going to have the kind of enforcement that we now have, we are going to have enforcement officers using their positions to feather their nests, we are going to have officials using their positions as a means for providing booze for themselves and their friends.

A law can only be enforced by those who believe in its enforcement and it probably is no exaggeration to say that half of those charged with enforcement of the prohibition amendment do not believe in its enforcement.

That's why national and state officials, judges, police officials, business men, professional men and our children as young as 14 years of age are able to get the poison

that now passes for whisky. There might be a riot if The Sentinel published the names of Cottage Grove kiddies that have no difficulty in getting whisky.

But the great political parties will write dry platforms.

## THE KELLEY CASE.

The Sentinel has been supported by the supreme court of the state in its contention that the claim of Ellsworth Kelley that he was illegally incarcerated in the state penitentiary and therefore not guilty of murder in shooting his way out of prison, was too far fetched for serious consideration. In a discussion of the case The Sentinel said that such a claim could not hold unless it had been advanced at the trial at which he was convicted and would not be good reason for keeping him from the noose unless he had failed to gain his liberty by legal means.

The supreme court has denied his release on a writ of habeas corpus, and in the opinion written by Justice Rand the court does not agree that Kelley was illegally incarcerated. "In any event," the opinion says, "he did not have a right to get away by violence and, if he believed he was illegally imprisoned, he should have appealed to the courts."

The Sentinel trusts that it will not be charged with having influenced the court in writing its opinion.

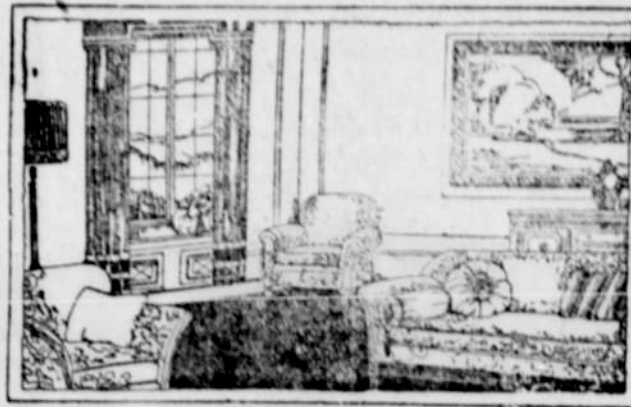
