\$10,000 in Preferred Cannery Stock Voted

Ten thousand dollars in preferred stock of the Cottage Grove cannery will be offered for sale, as the result of action taken by a meeting of stockholders this forenoon. The purpose of the new issue, which will be a preferred claim and may be retired at any time, is to refinance the institution and put it in condition for continuous and uninterrupted operation. More interest has been shown in the business recently than for a long time, there being a realization of what the cannery has meant to growers and business men.

FLAX IS PROFITABLE CROP FOR WILLAMETTE

Flaxseed has proved a valuable and profitable rotation crop on grain lands of certain soil types in Oregon. It is a cash crop worthy of the consideration of all grain growers. Flax for seed for the linseed oil industry should not be confused with fiber flax used by linen mills.

Seed flax is planted, harvested and threshed with the same farm equipment used for wheat and other cereal crops. It should be sown about April first and matures in 90 to 100 days.

Flax thrives best on heavy soils suitable for wheat production. Statistics prepared by the Oregon Agricultural college show that on 13 representative Willamette valley farms spring oats netted less than 60 per cent as much money as seed flax grown on the same farm. Contrary to the general impression, flax is not hard on the soil—in fact it has been shown to remove less nitrogen-phosphate-potash than wheat, oats or barley.

Buster McCue, small son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter McCue, died Friday at the family home on Mosby creek. The lad was aged 9 years, 2 months 29 days. He was born in this city November 4, 1918. Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Mills chapel, Pastor Clive Taylor of the Christian church officiating. Interment was in the A. F. & A. M.-I. O. O. F. cemetery.
