Audrey Wolford and Vernell Koeh have been chosen to represent Walker union high school at the O. A. C. conference February 17 and 18.

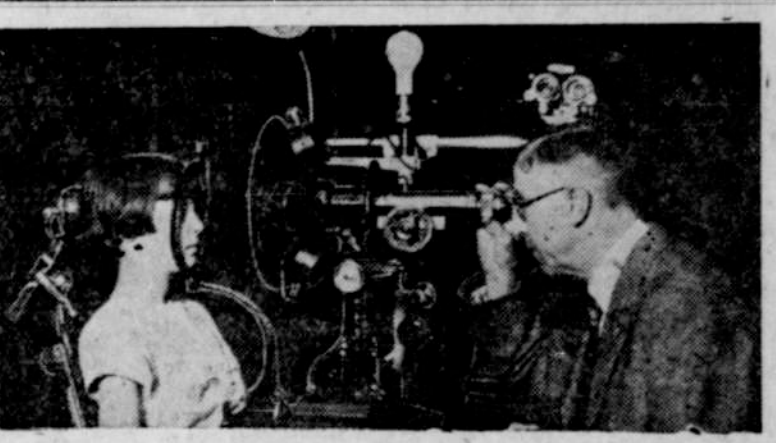
Leonard Johnson was taken to a Eugene hospital Thursday in a critical condition. The last reports received were that he was slightly improved.
