Kelly's Plane Forced Down by Fog

Lt. Oakley G. Kelly, noted aviator and chief of aviation at Vancouver, left his plane last night at Creswell, having been forced down by fog.

He was on his way to Vancouver from Corvallis, Cal., and had intended to land at Eugene for gas. The fog was down in the tree tops and he was unable to find the aviation field and proceeded as far north as Salem, but the fog there was the same. He remembered that he had been able to see through the fog at Creswell, returned there and landed just before his gas gave out. He again took the air for Eugene but was again unable to land and returned to Creswell. He skidded around over the country there for some time before making the first landing in the field of Verne Sly. He planned to resume his flight this forenoon.

Dangerous Wrecks May Be Forced Off Roads

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Believing a large number of the mounting list of auto accidents are caused by the use of too many cars that have out-lived their period of dependable service, W. Howard Winheim, Pasadena automobile dealer, has proposed a plan whereby all machines of this description would be required to undergo a thorough mechanical inspection to determine whether or not they are in condition to be operated safely in present day traffic.

This plan is not aimed at the owner of a good used car, according to Winheim, but is merely intended to protect the others from the menace of those automobiles that have passed their life of dependability and safety.

This plan also calls for an inspection of brakes and steering mechanism on all cars every 90 days.

Armless Aviator Plans To Imitate Lindberg

FRESNO, Cal., Feb. 16.—(AP)—Despite the loss of both arms, Loxia C. Thornton, local aviator, plans to duplicate the feat of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and fly from New York to Paris.

For the past nine years Thornton has been piloting airplanes. He has overcome his handicap by use of a device which enables him to fly an airplane, drive an automobile, and even perform such small tasks as lighting a match.

At present he is negotiating for financial backing. If he is successful in his efforts to obtain a plane, Thornton plans a non-stop flight from coast to coast to familiarize himself with the craft before attempting the Atlantic hop.

Although refusing to divulge all his plans at this time, the aviator has announced his intention of taking off from New York next July.

HOG FUEL BURNER IS INSTALLED AT SCHOOL

Installation of a "hog" burner at the west side school building has been ordered by the school board, the work to be completed before the opening of the fall term. The burner, which is the first to be used in the local schools, will be installed as an experiment and, if successful, will likely result in the use of this type of heating system in all the school buildings of the city. The Economy Fuel company, of which E. W. Frans is manager, will install the system. The fuel is prepared at the J. H. Chambers & Son mill.

Construction of forest roads in the two states amounted to \$2,443,807, of which \$1,960,415 was from federal funds.

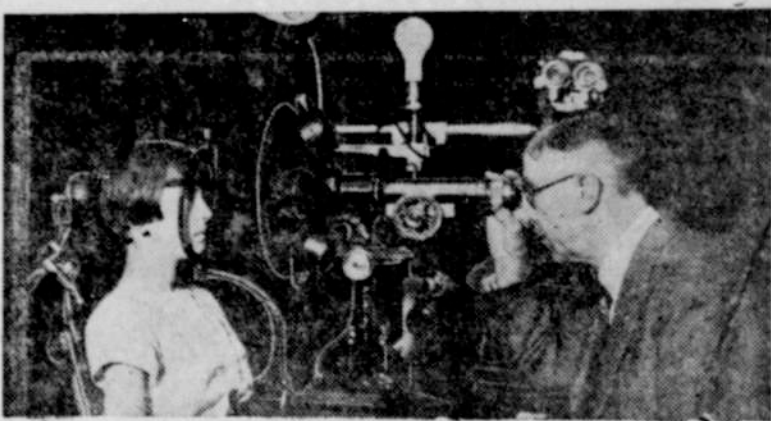
